Another installment as to the cost of naval repairs has been sent to Congress. There is in the navy an unarmed screw steamer called the Tennessee. Since 1865, the sum of \$1,446,348 has been expended upon her for repairs; and the sum of \$476,221 for equipments. Repairs upon the steamer Kearsarge have cost \$892,769, and equipments \$186,000. These are but two sample vessels. There are three other vessels—Pensacola, Brooklyn and Hartford—upon which over \$3,500,000 have been expended for repairs during the last seventeen years. It is conceded plain that these amounts were not legitimately expended, but that very large portions were either wasted or stolen, and with such facts pread before them, even Republican Congressmen will hesitate to grant a \$30,000,000 appropriation asked for to "rehabilitate the American navy."

JOURNALISTIC. Our good friend Wade Harris, of the Concord Sun, has become local editor of the Charlotte Observer, and the Sun is hereafter to be published by the Sun Publishing Company. The Observer, by the way, comes to us of late in a new dress, enlarged and improved. It is now, as it has been for so many years past, one of the best newspapers in the country.

The Rocky Mount Reporter is a new claimant for popular favor. It is published every Friday by Mr. W. J. Fitzgerald, at \$2 a year. It will be Democratic in politics, and we welcome it with pleasure.

JOBBERY AND CORRUPTION.

The Republicans have control of every branch of the government—executive, legislative and judicial—and they will be held responsible by the people for every law that miscarries, and for every enactment of plunder and jobbery. They have everything their own way, and are carrying out a programme of corruption which must surely prove disastrous in the end to its authors. They have constructed the committees to suit their own schemes, and the Republican leader in the House, Secor Roberson, a man with an exceedingly unsavory record, has boldly declared that the policy of his party in this Congress is to antagonize the economic policy of the Democrats for the last three Congresses. The New York Sun administers a scathing rebuke. In a double-headed editorial it says:

The legislative, executive, and judicial bill for the next fiscal year exceeds in the aggregate the present law by \$2,650,388; and the Committee of Appropriations pretend to excuse this large and unjustifiable increase by saying that it is less by \$1,484,855 than the estimates, which were purposely excessive, and made so by the different departments and bureaus for this very use. The Post Office bill, the Indian bill, the Army bill, the Agricultural bill, the Deficiency bills, and others thus far reported or passed, are, without exception, loaded down with additions to the usual grants that will foot up millions. Multitudes of new offices have been created, and yet the public service swarms with old sinecures and idlers. In the House of Representatives the Committee on Appropriations consists of fifteen members—nine Republicans and six Democrats. Frank Hiscok is Chairman, and Secor Roberson is second in order, but first in consequence and in management. Of the whole number there are but three Democratic members who in any proper sense can be called economists.

This important committee was packed by Roberson to do the very work that Randall, Holman, Blount, and other Democrats, who had proved themselves the efficient friends of economy, and whose experience is of great value in legislation, were excluded intentionally from this committee because they would be stumbling blocks in the way of jobs. Mr. Whitthorne was put off the Committee on Naval Affairs, where he had saved millions to the Treasury, and had exposed the venality of Secor Roberson, because his presence there would have checked the schemes of plunder which are held back to wait a favorable chance in the House.

Prodigality is visible in every direction. The policy of retrenchment, introduced in the Forty-fourth Congress by the Democrats, and by which the expenditures were reduced thirty millions in the first year they controlled the appropriations, has been radically reversed. The Republican rule is extravagance, loose legislation and jobbery.

These facts cannot be concealed from the country, and others like them equally damning, will enter seriously into the demagogue, no misrepresentations of the living politician, can mislead the people, with this record to convict the Republican party of wilful waste, of organized raids on the Treasury, and of matured schemes of plunder.

The Republicans have possession of every branch of the Government—legislative, executive and judicial. They have the committees to shape legislation in their own way. They are responsible for every dollar of expenditure and for every job that may be passed; and they will not be permitted to escape that responsibility.

The imports of foreign merchandise into the port of New York during the past week were again considerable in volume, their total value being \$10,075,083, of which \$8,043,885 represented general merchandise, and the remainder dry goods. Sugar and metals are the leading items. The imports of the first named article alone being \$2,206,251. Since January 1st the imports aggregate \$187,692,862, against \$159,771,782 for the corresponding period of last year.

On application of counsel, the case of ex-Governor Moses was indefinitely postponed yesterday in New York. A plea of insanity will be entered to-day. The case of the city of Marseilles, France, against the ex-Empress Eugenie, to recover possession of the chateau presented to the late Emperor, has been decided in favor of the ex-Empress, who has been awarded her costs in the case.

PERSONAL.

The funeral of the late Edward B. White, the ex-Confederate officer, who was a native of Charleston and a graduate of West Point, took place in New York from the church of St. Ignatius. The services were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Ewer. The remains were interred in Woodlawn cemetery.
