The Club has some money which will be judiciously expended in furtherance of the welfare of the members. None of the plans of the committee are far enough advanced as yet to make them public.

**School Exercises.**  
The closing exercises of the Hemmenway School, on Fourth, between Red Cross and Campbell streets, took place yesterday, between the hours of 10 a. m. and 2 p. m. Quite a number of lady and gentlemen visitors were present, many of whom had children in attendance as pupils. The exercises consisted of a review of the different studies pursued during the session, and were in the highest degree satisfactory. The recitations developed the fact of constant care and watchfulness, combined with thoroughness on the part of the teachers. It seems to have been the effort of the teachers to teach the pupils to think, and not be satisfied with what is most frequently the case, parrot-like performance of repetition from mere memory. In grammar, geography, and particularly in mental arithmetic, the several classes manifested a knowledge and power of analysis which was very gratifying. In the latter science, problems which would have puzzled older heads with slate and pencil, were analyzed, and the solutions given with remarkable clearness and precision, and unknown quantities were sought and found readily by mental algebraic demonstration.

Mrs. F. J. Wise is the Principal of this school, with Miss M. O. Wallace as her assistant. Miss M. C. Duguid has charge of the intermediate department; Mrs. M. L. McLeod has charge of the first primary department and Miss A. J. Yarborough has charge of the second primary department. Each teacher, in her individual department, is painstaking, thorough, watchful and earnest in the special duties and in the particular department over which she exercises supervision and for which she is responsible.  
The total number of pupils enrolled for the term was 180, and the average attendance, in each department, was between 30 and 40.

**Lippincott's Magazine.**  
*Lippincott's* for June opens with an interesting and well-illustrated article on "Toledo," by S. P. Scott. Dr. Felix L. Oswald has an entertaining paper on "Traps," which is also illustrated. William H. Rideing gives an account of "English Lawyers and Law-Courts," and Lucy H. Hooper summarizes the recently published recollection of a French comedian, Samson. "Art and Art-Life in New York," by an anonymous writer; is not a critical paper, but a lively sketch giving all the information in regard to art-societies, studies, exhibitions, and receptions which the general reader needs in order to understand the discussions on the subject now so frequent in cultivated circles as well as in the journals, and to appreciate the influence which art is beginning to exercise on our social life. "On the Wheel," by "Kol Kron," treats of "travelling by bicycle." The fiction in this number merits particular notice. The conclusion of "Stephen Guthrie" is well managed. "An Absent-Minded Hero," by Celia P. Woolley, is an unusually well written story. "The Romance of a Coffin," by Jane G. Austin, embodies in a spirited manner and with strong local coloring a family tradition of Old Nantucket, and "A Strange Night's Lodging," by Hart Ayrault, deals with incidents, which, if not very probable, are vividly told. There are several poems, and the usual complement and variety of papers in the editorial department. A new serial, entitled "Fairy Gold," will commence in the July number, and run through the rest of the year.

**Attempt at Suicide.**  
Yesterday afternoon, about 3 o'clock, Mr. Samuel R. Bell attempted to commit suicide by taking laudanum. He went to a drug store and purchased two ounces of the deadly drug and started off up the street. When about a square from the store, he put the vial to his lips and drained it of its contents, and continued his walk in the direction of the house in which his wife lived. He was overtaken by his sister, who happened to be going in that direction, and walked with him to the house of a friend on the corner of Seventh and Ann streets, when he announced that he had taken laudanum. Officer Fred Skipper, who was on duty in that part of the town, was called on for assistance, and at once took Mr. Bell out and walked him around, and finally took him to his father's residence, where he has been living for the past month. Physicians were sent for and the usual antidotes were administered, but before they arrived Mr. Bell had gone to sleep. A colored woman saw him take the drug and thinks he did not swallow all of it as it seemed to gag him and he spat some of it on the ground. Officer Skipper says that the unfortunate man told him during the walk and before he lost consciousness that he "had two ounces of laudanum in him; that he was tired and wanted rest." The cause of Mr. Bell's rash act is assigned to domestic troubles and it is thought he took the poison in a paroxysm of mental aberration. At a late hour he was still unconscious but his physicians entertain hopes for his ultimate recovery.

**Moonlight on the Water.**  
The most delightful event of the season, thus far, is offered in the moonlight excursion proposed by the Wilmington Library Association on next Tuesday evening, on the steamer *Passport*. The boat will leave at 7.30 and return about midnight, and there will be music and refreshments on board.
