Work About the Murderer.

Republican Nominating Convention.
The Republican Nominating Convention met in the Court House yesterday morning. The delegates went into caucus and settled the matter of the controlling delegates from the Upper Division of the First Ward and then from the Fifth Ward by a compromise.

The Convention was called to order by Gen. S. H. Manning, Chairman of the County Executive Committee. Jos. E. Sampson acted as Secretary and Capt. E. J. Pennypacker was appointed poll-holder. The meeting was exceedingly orderly and the nominations were made with but little trouble. The nominations had evidently been “cut and dried.” There seems to be much dissatisfaction among some of the fire-tried. One of them remarked to us in the Convention that “the people was left out;” said he, “don’t you see the Court House ring on the bench and the Custom House at the desk; we ain’t going to stand that kind of thing.” The Convention was in every way orderly and those who went there to see a circus left disappointed and chagrined.
