The Superior Court for this county met yesterday, Judge Gilmer presiding, and Mr. Solicitor Galloway in attendance.

Hail Storm.

A terrible hail storm passed over that portion of the county adjacent to the northern terminus of the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad, on Sunday.

Sentenced to be Hung.

On Saturday, the 3rd inst., at the Superior Court of Sampson County, held at Clinton, Judge Gilmer presiding Philip Faison, colored, was convicted of the murder of Henry Sellars, also colored, and sentenced to be hung July 11th, 1882.

Water as a Disinfectant.

The disinfecting power of water has been receiving considerable attention of late. With the exception of charcoal, it is said that no other substance is so perfect an absorbent of odors.

County Commissioners.

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular monthly session yesterday, present, Chairman Bagg and Commissioners Worth, Montgomery and Pearce.

The Register of Deeds submitted his monthly report of fees received from marriage licenses for the month of May, amounting to \$7.60, and exhibited Treasurer's receipts for same.

A petition was received for a public road from the Southern line of the city to Barnum's Creek over the bridge at McIlhenny's mill pond.

The application of F. Martin to attend to the electric fire alarm was referred to the Committee on Fire Department.

Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met in regular monthly session last evening. His Honor the Mayor and Aldermen Huggins, Alderman, Worth, Northrop, Bowden Sampson and Willis being present.

The Committee on Fire Department on the removal of one of the steam fire engines to the North side of the W. & W. railroad, reported against said removal.

The same committee reported adversely on disposing of one or more of the steam fire engines. Adopted.

The same committee on the resolutions in regard to the storage of Petroleum beg to say that they are not prepared to make any recommendation in the matter, but submit sundry letters and papers for the information of the Board.

On motion the report, with said letters and papers, was received. Alderman Northrop moved that it be the sense of the Board that an ordinance should be passed covering the storage of Petroleum, and that the Committee on Ordinances be instructed to draw up a suitable ordinance.

The Committee on Public Buildings, in regard to the sale of the Bucket Company's house on Ninth street, reported progress and was granted further time.

The Committee on Streets and Wharves reported that the wharf at the foot of Chestnut street and the bulkhead at the foot of Red Cross were finished.

The special committee on park and fountain, on the site of the old market, reported adversely on account of want of funds.

The Committee on Water Works, in the matter of locating 30 additional hydrants, reported that 29 had been placed in position and recommended that the payment for the use of the hydrants be commenced on the first day of June.

The same committee, in the matter of putting water in the City Hall, reported progress. The matter was referred back to the committee with power to act in conjunction with the Board of Audit and Finance.

The Mayor reported that the Pauper Burial Ground had been turned over to the county and that the deeds had been transferred.

The Committee on Hospital made a satisfactory report and stated that the expenses were less last month than for any previous month, and that the expense for June would be still less.

A communication from the Board of Audit and Finance approving the action of the Board of Aldermen in reference to the matter of the Pauper Burial Ground, license tax on insurance agents and awarding the listing of taxes to Col. J. G. Burr, was read.

The Committee on Fire Department recommended the appointment of an Assistant Chief of the Fire Department without pay.

Mr. Miles C. Smith was unanimously elected Assistant Chief of the Fire Department with full power.

It was recommended by Alderman Huggins that the matter of improving Fifth street be referred to the Committee on Streets and Wharves.

The Wilmington Acrobatic Club notified the Board that they had organized a Hose Reel Company and asked that the city give them 500 feet of hose.

Permission was granted to the Cape Fear Fire Engine Company to visit Charlotte on July 3rd and to be absent three days.

Alderman Northrop moved that in the future the city bell be rung only in the case of fire and then the district only be struck.

The matter of the wash on Ann street, between Second and Third streets, was referred to the Committee on Streets and Wharves.

The application of F. Martin to attend to the electric fire alarm was referred to the Committee on Fire Department.

The petition of Messrs. J. Hahn and

H. M. Bowden & Co. to erect a stationary wooden awning frame in front of their stores was not granted unless in compliance with the ordinance of the city.

The reports of the Superintendent of Health and Chief of the Fire Department for the month of May were read and ordered on file.

The Board adjourned to meet during the summer months at 3:30 o'clock.

School Entertainment.

Distress of the "Minnehaha."

The following telegram was received here last evening from Capt. Bisbey, of the steamer Minnehaha: CAPE LOOKOUT, June 5th, 1882.—Capt. McGowan, Wilmington, N. C.:

The Revenue Cutter Calfax left last night, and it is thought reached the Minnehaha this morning. Coast pilots say that the steamer is lying at anchor in a comfortable position, and will suffer no damage.

Dedication of St. Paul's Church

About two hundred persons left this city, Sunday, on a special train, for Farmer's Turnout, where the new Catholic church was dedicated. Arriving at the station, the excursionists found about one hundred persons in waiting to meet them.

The procession around the church, while the outer walls were being blessed, was very imposing. The cross bearer led the procession, and was followed by the candle bearers.

After the journey around the church was made, the procession stopped at the door and chanted a hymn, and then moved into the church, followed by the choir, Mrs. John Bauman, Miss Sue Reilly and Mr. John W. Reilly.

Concove's Mass was sung by the choir. Bishop Northrop preached an eloquent sermon, and at 2 o'clock services were held and the Rev. Father Oberley preached a fine sermon.
