We regret to learn that Capt. Thomas Jacobs, of the steam tug *Blanche*, is lying quite sick at Smithville. We trust he will soon recover.

The Democrats of Greene county, in convention assembled, last Saturday, endorsed Capt. Swift Galloway for Solicitor and urged his renomination.

The only case before His Honor Mayor Smith yesterday was that of Dick Martin, the accordion fiend. He was fined and paid \$5 for being disorderly.

The bodies of the horses and mule which were burned on Tuesday night were removed yesterday, and the scene of the late conflagration was thoroughly disinfected.

Mr. E. Peschau was damaged to the extent of about one hundred and fifty dollars by the fire last Tuesday night. His fences, cow sheds and other out-buildings, on which there was no insurance, were destroyed.

The attention of the Superior Court was taken up yesterday in hearing the evidence in the case of Swann vs. L. A. Hart et al. One of the jurors was taken sick, and the case was postponed until Friday, the 9th inst.

The reunion of Company K, 18th Regiment, will be held at Burgaw Saturday. There will be speaking, and the tales of the camp-fires will be told again. The festivities of the day will be brought to a close by a basket picnic.

The building is to be of wood, three stories high and 125 feet long. Mr. Giles will not go to Washington until some time in August, when the machinery will be set up.

Onslow County.
At a mass meeting of the citizens of Onslow county, held at Jacksonville, on Monday, June 5th, Judge A. A. McKay and Mr. Solicitor Galloway were recommended for renomination and the following resolution was adopted:
Resolved, That we thoroughly approve and heartily endorse the course of our worthy Representative in Congress, Hon. Jno. W. Shackelford, and think his acts and course while in Congress stamp him as worthy of a recommendation by the next County Convention.

Military Spirit in Monroe.
The military spirit has reached Monroe and permeated thoroughly the spirit of its young men. A meeting was called there last Saturday and the whole town turned out. Gen. M. P. Taylor was present and spoke to the gathering. His speech seems to have had an excellent effect for it was resolved then and there to organize a new company which by this time has probably been fully effected. The company, rank and file, will muster about 50 men.

Colonel John W. Gordon, of Richmond, Va., was in the city yesterday. He has been rusticated on the Sound, at Captain Manning's place, for several days.
Captain Van Richardson, of Columbus county, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Third Congressional District, and Mr. A. C. Huggins, Clerk of the Superior Court in Onslow county, are now in the city and registered at the Purcell House.

Making Merchandise of Our Beauties.
An enterprising nurseryman of Pascaic, N. J., has had a gardener in our neighborhood for the last two weeks gathering plants peculiar to our region. Among other things he got 300 fly traps, many spoon lilies (Xanthosomas), and some Summer iris, but the biggest haul was 1,200 rice field blue bells.

Look out now for the ladies who order plants from the North. Next year they will get a catalogue with a cut of a beautiful new flower with the sounding name of clematis crispa (blue bell—blue jessamine) willingly paying 50 cents to \$1, whereas a half hour's walk to Little Bridge would secure many of them for nothing. It is a pity to make merchandise of our beauties.

The Fire Last Night.
We stated in yesterday's issue that Benj. Scott, the proprietor of the lively stables which were burned on Tuesday night, was partially insured, and we are glad to know now that we were correct. He was insured in Messrs. John W. Gordon & Co.'s Agency in this city for \$3,050, as follows: \$250 on stable building, \$150 on stable and paint shop in the rear, \$1,750 on carriages, &c., \$50 on stable and office furniture, tools, &c., \$50 on hay and other feed and \$800 on horses and mules. This does not, however, cover the entire loss.

The origin of the fire is still a great mystery. A colored man by the name of George, who was in charge during Scott's absence from the city, says that he locked up and went off home about 9 o'clock and that at that time there was so sign anywhere about of fire. There were eight horses and one mule burned alive, one of the horses having been the property of Sheriff Manning, the others and the mule all belonging to Scott. One mule was saved but he is badly burned.
