Alligator.
On the last trip down the river of the steamer *John Dawson* a large alligator about 8 feet long was shot while lying up on the bank sunning. The wounded alligator plunged into the water and attacked the steamer, and it was thought that it would crawl upon the deck. Several large balls were fired into his body from the upper deck and his gatorship sank beneath the surface of the water.

The Fire Yesterday.
The alarm of fire was sounded yesterday afternoon, about 3 o'clock, caused by the burning of a chicken coop on the premises of Mr. John King, at the southern extremity of Front street. The fire department turned out promptly, but were turned back before the engines reached the fire. Mr. King had been smoking his chicken coop and instructed a boy to watch it, but the urchin left, and the coop took fire.

The Fire Alarm.

It is almost a matter of impossibility to hear the bell at a distance of three squares from the tower. The firemen ask that in case of fire the church bells, to which are attached fire alarms, be rung. They are anxious and willing to go promptly to a fire but the majority of the time the engines have been out and get to a fire before the firemen are aware that there is a conflagration. It seems to us they ask but little and we have no doubt that the authorities will order the church bells rung.
