In olden times, when an infant was baptized it was carried to the church wrapped in a quilt made of the choicest silk. This one was made for the christening quilt of her grandfather.

Exports Foreign.

Norwegian barque *Eolus*, Captain Kiogh, cleared yesterday for Antwerp, with 750 casks spirits turpentine and 1,300 barrels rosin, valued at \$17,596.82, shipped by Messrs. Paterson, Downing & Co. The Norwegian brig *Gazellen*, Capt. Weibge, cleared yesterday for Belfast, Ireland, with 500 casks spirits turpentine and 1,561 barrels rosin, valued at \$16,100, shipped by Messrs. Alex. Sprunt & Son.

Mr. J. A. Long Repudiates the Unauthorized Use of His Name by the Mott Concern. As my name has been put in nomination by the convention of the 7th inst., for the office of judge of this, the 6th district, I deem it just to myself that I should say that my name was used in that convention without my knowledge or consent in any way whatsoever. I had never a thought of such a thing, nor had anyone directly or indirectly mentioned or hinted it to me, and since it was made I have respectfully declined to accept the nomination. My position on the question of prohibition last year, as one of the opponents, doubtless had much to do with influencing the convention to put my name on the ticket. While it is true I was an anti-prohibitionist, and did what I could in my humble way to defeat it, I never believed the question a party one, or in any way a test of party fealty. I never believed, with Judge Merrimon, the act in force at all events, notwithstanding my regard for his legal attainments. The question is now a settled one, and as one of the Democrats who helped to settle it, I do not propose to go outside of the ranks of the Democratic party to attempt to correct any supposed mistakes it may have made in the matter. I do not propose to board the vessel of the enemy in order to try to scuttle my own ship. I do propose to stay on board and help beat back the assaults of the enemy, and if the ship goes down, I propose to go down with the ship. T. A. LONG.

STATE NEWS.

Goldsboro Messenger: At the Republican judicial convention, held at Elizabeth City on Saturday, C. C. Pool was nominated for the judgeship, Grandly receiving very few votes indeed.—John A. Moore, of Halifax, received at Goldsboro on Monday the Republican nomination for Judge in the 8d District, and John H. Collins, colored, is renominated for Solicitor.

Charlotte Observer: The suit which has been pending in the Superior Court of Mecklenburg county, against the Air-Line Railroad Company, by the widow of James Whisnant, the engineer who was killed in an accident on that road in December, 1880, has been compromised, Mrs. Whisnant agreeing to accept \$6,250 and withdraw her suit against the company. In this same accident Ned Stroud, colored, and Chas. Sellers, white, employes on the train, were killed, and suits against the company by their relatives are now pending for \$5,000 and \$10,000 damages, respectively.

Wadesboro Times: Mr D L Talton sends us some sample oats that measure 7 feet 21 inches.—On Saturday evening last a child of Mr H D Pinkston, while playing in the yard, started on a high glass lamp, which the other children had in their playhouse. His throat was badly cut, and a piece of glass an inch long was taken from the wound. Dr Ingram was summoned immediately, and succeeded in staying the blood and dressing the wound. The child made a narrow escape.
