Burglary.
 The residence of Mr. Jesse Ives, on the corner of Fifth and Bladen streets, was burglariously entered Sunday night. The thief effected an entrance through the kitchen window, and then entered the dining-room and pantry. All of the provisions in the house were taken by the thieves. About 100 pounds of flour which was in a barrel, was emptied in a table-cloth and carried off. The thief was evidently hungry.

The injury is a very severe one but in no way dangerous. Mr. Prempert was brought immediately to this city where his arm was set and the necessary medical attendance given him. Post no Bills!
 It is now against the law to paste bills or posters on any fence in the city without the consent of the owner. Seven young colored men, whose names appeared on a poster—as a committee—pasted on the fence of a gentleman in this city, were arrested yesterday and were tried by the Mayor for the offence. In view of the fact that they were ignorant of the law, the Chairman of the committee was fined \$1, and the balance were discharged. His Honor imposed the fine only as a warning to others who may be guilty of the same offence. He will not be as lenient hereafter. The fine was paid by the committee.

Severely Bruised.
 Mr. T. Donlan, the efficient and energetic Superintendent of Oakdale Cemetery, met with quite a serious accident yesterday afternoon. He was riding along on his cart, on Fifth street, just as the rain came up, when a piece of paper was blown against the mule which drew the cart. The animal shied and threw Mr. Donlan between the wheel and body of the cart. He was considerably bruised before the animal could be stopped. He was taken to his home and received the necessary medical attendance. We hope he will be out in a few days.

 Robt. Williams, a young white man living in this city, was arrested yesterday by Deputy Marshal Jos. H. Neff, charged with robbing the U. S. Mail. While he carried the mail six registered letters were missing and the Postoffice Department have been working the case up. The young man was not arrested until late, but when he was arrested he acknowledged to have taken one of the missing letters. He says the letter contained 10 ten-cent postage stamps and one \$5 bill. He denies any knowledge of the others. He was sent to jail by Commissioner McQuigg in default of a bond of \$500.

 Ger. brig *De Witt*, Zeppelin, cleared yesterday for Hull, Eng., with 1,406 casks spirits turpentine and 500 barrels rosin, valued at \$31,041.50, shipped by Chess-Carley Co. Br. barque *August*, Capt. McDonald, cleared on the 24th inst., for London with 3,500 barrels rosin, valued at \$7,500.

 Seven young colored men, whose names were requested to withhold, were arrested for defacing a fence. One was fined \$1 and the others discharged.

Col. Moore's Remarks.
 Some of Col. Roger Moore's friends differ with us as to the exact tenor of his remarks in the Convention on Saturday last. In referring the matter to Col. Moore he informs us that in the course of his remarks he stated that he felt like offering a resolution thanking Mr. Darby for resigning the position as Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee; an expression of regret that it had taken him so long to find out that he was not in accord with the party in an economic administration of the County and State governments, as at present administered, and which are the very salvation of the tax-payers of the Eastern portion of the State; and that the good old party could survive his desertion.

Close of the Session.
 The scholastic year of Misses Burr & James' school closed last Friday. The examinations have been taking place during the past ten days. There are four graduates, who have undergone a thorough and searching examination in the primary as well as in the advanced branches included in the course, which have been most meritorious. Yesterday afternoon compositions were read and specimens in free hand drawing were executed upon the blackboards, without patterns. This evening the Soiree will take place, at which time the graduates will each read essays and one of them will deliver a valedictory and all will receive their diplomas. The exercises will be private, only a limited number of tickets to be issued outside of the patrons of the school.

STATE NEWS.
 Lenoir Topic: The dwelling house of Mr. Jones Coffey, who lives in Watauga township, is exactly on the top of the Blue Ridge, and its roof forms part of the great watershed between the streams flowing into the Atlantic and those flowing into the Gulf of Mexico. In twenty steps of his house are two springs, one of which is tributary to the Catawba through John's river, and the other tributary to the Ohio through the great Watauga and Tennessee rivers.

Charlotte Observer: We regret to announce the death of Col. T. W. Brevard, which occurred in Tallahassee, Florida, Tuesday night last, of congestion of the brain. Col. Brevard was a brother of Dr. R. J. Brevard, of this city. He was a prominent lawyer and politician. —Cyrus W. Wolfe, of Sharon township, this county, threshed out a crop of wheat, about a hundred bushels, one morning this week, had two bushels of it sent to mill and ground, and ate biscuits made of the flour at the evening meal. —Miss Blanche Wolfe, of Sharon congregation, Presbyterian, aged twelve years, has received a Bible presented by the "Spencer and Fraling-husen Fund," New York city, to the child who would commit to memory the Shorter catechism entire. This child did the task and repeated the catechism perfectly from end to end.

News and Observer: It is proposed to establish in this city a museum of Confederate relics. We should have had one years ago. But there are scattered here and there many objects of great interest, whose value in this sense will be enhanced many times by being placed with others. —A telegram received in this city announces the death of Wyatt F. Bowman, Esq., a prominent citizen and capitalist of Winston, who died in that town yesterday morning, from paralysis. Mr. Bowman was President of the Wachovia National Bank, of Winston. Mr. R. M. Sauls, aged 35 years, whose home was on Davie street, near Blount, died Wednesday night, at Clement's mill pond, this county. He was one of a fishing party, other members of which were his brother, Mr. C. H. Beine and J. H. Kenfrow, and all were asleep in a house near the pond. Yesterday morning at

daybreak they went to wake Mr. Sauls, when it was found that he was still in death.
