Cotton.

The receipts of cotton at this port from July 1 to July 8 of this year, foot up 133 bales, against 462 bales for July 1 to July 11, 1881, a decrease this week of 329 bales. The receipts for the crop year to date foot up 135,950 bales, against 118,134 to July 11, 1881, an increase this year of 17,816 bales.

Exports Foreign.

Nor. barque *Frid*, Capt. Neilson, cleared yesterday for London, with 1,875 casks spirits turpentine and 200 barrels rosin, valued at \$39,388, shipped by Messrs. D. R. Murchison & Co. Ger. barque *Edward Penn*, Capt. Kepp, cleared yesterday for Hamburg, with 3,384 barrels rosin, valued at \$6,207, shipped by Messrs. Paterson, Downing & Co.

The Case of Highway Robbery.

The case of John Johnson, colored, charged with highway robbery, was heard in the Court House yesterday afternoon, by Justice McQuigg. Mr. M. Bellamy represented the prosecution and Mr. Jno. D. Bellamy the defense. The witnesses for the State were examined. The gun, which was found on Johnson's possession and which is claimed by him, was identified by several persons as the one which was taken from Masters Worth and Huggins and the young gentlemen, without swearing positively to the identity of Johnson, are positive that the robber was a man who resembled the prisoner in stature, voice and actions. They described a peculiar skull cap which was worn by the robber on the occasion and it was proved that Johnson at that time owned and wore a cap of the kind described. The witnesses for the defense were not examined; the counsel for the defense stated as his reason for not doing so was that he did care to show his grounds of defense, or rebutting testimony, until the case was tried before the Criminal Court. He stated that he could prove the prisoner's innocence and further prove that the gun in question was his and that he came by it in a legitimate way. The prisoners were committed to jail in default of a justified bond of \$500.
