For the Babies.
A citizen who has tried it, says that the most comfortable arrangement for a sleeping baby during hot weather is a sort of cot bottom applied to the crib or cradle. Take out the mattress and all the clothes and make a light frame of strips of wood, of such a size as to fit the crib. This frame is covered with stout unbleached cotton, of somewhat open texture, tacked around the edge of the frame, but not stretched very tight. The covered frame is then placed in the crib in place of the mattress, etc., and supported at the four corners by blocks or screws so that the sag or stretch of the cloth will be just above the slats. This forms a cool and luxurious bed for the little one, with a circulation of air around and under him, and thereby secures perfect rest, even during the hottest weather. Every mother of plump, hearty children, knowing how they perspire and suffer with heat and restlessness when asleep on the ordinary bed or mattress, would appreciate the above arrangement, which can be made by any one.

The Drowning of Two Little Boys—Gallant Conduct.

The sad and distressing announcement of the drowning of two young boys in the surf at Oak Island, opposite the sea wall of Fort Caswell, was received in this city yesterday afternoon, by telegraph, about 3 o'clock. The boys went down the river on the Passport yesterday morning and as soon as the boat landed at her wharf at Caswell jumped ashore and ran around the beach to the old rock wall where they undressed and went in bathing with five or six of their companions. The wind was blowing very fresh and a strong under tow was setting out. The boys played about in the water for some time when they were drifted around towards the bar, as the tide was then rising. They were carried beyond the old wreck which lies on the shore-end of the rip. Three of the boys, who made up the seven, gained the shore and seeing Capt. Harper coming around the point of the beach, beckoned to him. He ran as fast as possible, thinking his services were needed, and soon saw that four boys were in the breakers struggling for life. He disrobed himself as he ran and plunged in and swam to the assistance of the boys who were fast weakening from exhaustion. Just before he reached them, Masters Sigismund Bear, son of Mr. Sam'l Bear, and Jacob Sternberger, young Bear sank beneath the waves. Capt. Harper went down under the water for the boy and caught him with his foot. He brought the prostrate body to the surface of the water and told young Sternberger to hold to him. Capt. Harper took the body of young Bear under his left arm, and with Jacob Sternberger hanging to him, brought them safely to shore. Capt. Harper tried to keep his eye on the other two boys, who were further out, and as he turned to see where and how they were getting along, their little heads disappeared beneath the billows, which were rapidly increasing, as the wind grew stronger. When laying young Bear on the beach, he thought life was extinct, but vigorously tried to resuscitate him. After fifteen or twenty minutes' of rolling the body and following other rules for resuscitating, faint signs of respiration were noticeable. As quickly as possible the almost lifeless body of the boy was carried to the cabin of the steamer and there received such treatment as was necessary to complete his restoration. The two poor boys who were drowned were Julius Bear, aged 11 years, a son of Mr. Sam'l Bear, and Jacob Bear, aged 12 years, a son of Mr. Sol. Bear.

The drowning of the boys occurred at or about 1 o'clock. We should have stated above that Master Jacob Sternberger had nearly reached shore, and then turned back to assist young Sigismund Bear. He reached the lad in time to save him from going down, but subsequently called for assistance, as his companion had pinioned his arms to his side. Master Jacob succeeded in freeing himself, and then it was that Sigismund sank. As soon as the passengers of the boat could be gotten back from the fort, where they had wandered, the Passport steamed to Smithville, where Mr. Sol. Bear, the father of one of the boys and uncle of other was notified of the dreadful accident. Upon learning the facts, Mr. Bear fainted, and seemed to be for some time in a critical condition. Medical assistance was summoned, and after applying remedies, Mr. Bear revived a little, but was quite sick all the evening—in fact, so much so, that it was thought necessary for a physician to accompany him to this city. Dr. F. B. Bishop attended him on the trip up the river, and states that Mr. Bear's attack was produced from nervous exhaustion.

Search for the bodies were promptly commenced under instruction of Hon. S. H. Fishblade, who went immediately to Oak Island. As the tide was setting in at the time of the accident, the supposition is that the bodies were washed into the river, and we hope have been recovered ere this.

Capt. Harper's gallantry is a theme of general comment. Without a thought of self, as soon as he saw the first intimation of danger, he hastened to the rescue of the unfortunate boys. On the first signal of distress he ran down the beach at full speed, disencumbering himself of his clothing as he ran, and on arriving at the spot plunged without a moment's hesitation into the water. He did all he could do, and more than could have been thought possible under the circumstances, and at the imminent risk of his own life rescued two of the poor boys from a watery death. We mean no fulsome adulation when we

say that John Harper, God bless him, is a man from the crown of his head to the soles of his feet.

Laboratory Assistant.
We are pleased to learn that our young townsman, Mr. Thos. Radcliffe, has been appointed Laboratory Assistant in the Department of Chemistry, at the University at Chapel Hill. It gives us pleasure to chronicle the advancement of our young men, and with others, we say, this is a compliment most worthily bestowed.

STATE NEWS.
News and Observer: Mr Samuel Latham, Clerk of the Superior Court of Washington county, and a brother of Congressman Latham, died at Plymouth Wednesday.

Newbern Nut Shell: Rev G W Neal on Saturday received a telegram from Murfreesboro, N. C., announcing the sudden death, at that place, of Miss Imogene Hort, sister of Mrs G W Neal.

Elizabeth City Falcon: Gov. Jarvis, Judge Bennett and other distinguished speakers will be in our city at the Congressional convention on the 20th inst. and address the people. There will be a big time around here when the convention meets.

Greensboro Bugle: We counted this week, in a garden in this place, eighty sunflower plants, some of them 15 feet high, and having as many as 25 flowers to a single stalk. This would give the enormous yield of 2,000 flowers, with a fair showing of continuous blooming until frost.

Robesonian: There were upward of 20 conversions during the revival in the Methodist Church, which closed last week. A revival is now in progress at Back Swamp Baptist Church, conducted by the pastor, Rev Carson L. Powell, and assisted by Revs J D Clark and Everett Ward.

Greensboro Patriot: News comes from Wilmington that while a party of young men were carousing in the store of Thos Gardner, the latter handed a gun to Joe Dorsey, and told him to shoot the first man who left the place. Dorsey, who was drunk, obeyed, and as Leroy Clifton, a resident of Hamilton, left the building, shot him dead.

Raleigh Visitor: Mr. Harvey Carrow, of Washington, N. C., sold his trotting horse, Kuric Neville, in Chicago, a few days ago, for \$5,000. About two months since Mr. Carrow took this horse out to the west, under the charge of his trainer, Mr. Bryan. A few days ago he won his race, making the time in 2:22 and Mr. Carrow sold him the next day to a wealthy Chicago merchant, it is said, for \$5,000.

Salisbury Watchman: Four emphatic sounds of the locomotive whistle at the depot announced the arrival of the second cargo of coal brought over the Western North Carolina Railroad, from Tennessee. It is a portion of the 1,000 tons purchased by the Richmond & Danville Railroad and will be distributed at points on the road. This looks like business as also does the fact that the Richmond & Danville Company are having built one thousand freight cars and thirty new engines, all of which will come to the Salisbury shops for repairs.

Durham Plant: Wednesday last Mr. Hayward Malone, of Cedar Grove township, Orange county, a son of Henry Malone committed suicide by hanging. He was about thirty-five years old, leaves a wife and one child and was a prosperous well-to-do farmer. No cause has been assigned for the unfortunate affair except it be that his brain had been affected by too much exposure to the hot sun. He had an attack of the brain last August, since which time he has several times threatened to take his life. He used a halter-reen and was suspended from a limb of a large oak, his feet being within about six inches of the ground.
