The Drowning of Two Little say that John Harper, God bless him, The sad and distressing announcement of the drowning of two young boys in the surf at Oak Island, opposite the sea wall of Fort Caswell, was received in this city yesterday afternoon, by telegraph, about 3 o'clock. The boys went down the river on the Passport yesterday morning and as soon as the boat landed at her wharf at Caswell jumped ashore and ran around tde beach to the old rock wall where they undressed and went in bathing with five or six of their companions. The wind was blowing very fresh and a strong under tow was setting out. The boys played about in the water for then rising. They were carried beyond the old wreck which lies on the shore-end of the rip. Three of the boys, who made up the seven, gained the shore and seeing Capt. Harper coming around the point of the beach, Neal beckoned to him. He ran as fast as the breakers struggling for life.
