day afternoon, and it is feared that  
she will not be able to go all of the way  
through. She will make her way how-  
ever, to within a few miles of Fayette-  
ville, if she fails to make the landing  
at that place.

## The Heavens in July.

The July field of labor for the ama-  
teur telescopist is not an extensive one.  
Jupiter, Saturn and Mars are too far  
away to be favorable for observation.  
Venus still presents her gibbous phase,  
but is too near the sun for a satisfac-  
tory view. Mercury, until the 19th,  
takes on the form of a crescent. On  
the 19th his appearance is that of the  
moon at her first quarter. The rest of  
the month he presents the gibbous  
phase. It will require a powerful tele-  
scope to bring to view the sea-green  
disk of Uranus, but his delicate tint, in  
contrast with the ruddy hue of Mars,  
when, on the 27th, they are only six  
minutes apart, will be an interesting  
planetary study. Observations on the  
moon will receive a new impulse from  
recent events bearing upon her history.

## Pic Nic at Teachys.

Quite a large number of persons as-  
sembled at Teachy's Depot yesterday,  
to indulge in a pic nic. The young la-  
dies of the surrounding country turned  
out in full force, and looked their pret-  
tiest. The day was spent in pleasant

huge oaks in McMillan's grove, fairly  
groaned under the weight of the tempt-

nicers then returned to the platform  
and were soon twirling in the mazy  
waltz, and keeping time to the music  
furnished by the harpers. The day was

earth, cooling the atmosphere and  
making the night lovely and delicious  
for sleeping, to those who were per-  
mitted to indulge in such a luxury.

## STATE NEWS.

**Newbern Journal:** Mr. T. S. Gillet  
of Jones, was in the city on Tuesday.—  
Contrary to the general reports about  
cotton he gives a very flattering account  
of it in the White Oak section. He says  
it is, on an average, fully up to if not  
better than the usual crop.

**Greensboro Bugle:** S. C. Robertson  
has just dressed a block of beautiful  
blue soap stone for S. Steele, which is  
designed for exhibition at the approach-  
ing mineral exhibition at Boston. Mr.  
Steele's quarry is about three miles  
from Greensboro and is about one mile  
from the Richmond and Danville Rail-  
road, and is said to be of excellent qual-  
ity and to be found in inexhaustible  
quantities.

**Greensboro Patriot:** The Richmond  
& Danville, during the first six months,  
has done the largest six months busi-  
ness it ever did, but the rates have been  
lower on account of a falling off of fifty  
per cent. in the cotton freights, and the  
comparatively small traffic in fertiliz-  
ers. Usually there is a heavy business  
in fertilizers up to the middle of May.  
This year the business was all over by  
the first of April. The use of fertiliz-  
ers has been much smaller than usual.

**News and Observer:** Wake's wheat  
crop beats all her previous records as a  
grain growing county. Judge Gil-  
ham was delayed at Goldsboro, and  
hence was unable to begin the special  
term of Guilford Court on Monday. The  
Greensboro papers pay the Judge a high  
compliment for his despatch of business.

We regret to learn of a painful ac-  
cident to Mr. W. B. Phillips, assistant  
chemist at the State chemical station.—  
He was enjoying his vacation at Chapel  
Hill, and was at a pond near there bath-  
ing, when, diving into the water, he  
struck a sharp snag which lacerated his  
leg badly. He will probably be laid up  
for a month or two with his injuries.

**Goldsboro Messenger:** Miss Fannie  
Everitt, a popular teacher of the Golds-  
boro Graded School, leaves to-day for  
the north, to enter a five weeks course at  
the well-known Normal school at Mar-  
tha's Vineyard, in Massachusetts.—  
Quite a party left here yesterday for  
Waynesville. The party consisted of  
Mrs. Dr. Dewey, Mrs. W. F. Kornegay,  
Mr. and Mrs. Junius Slocumb, and the  
Misses Sally Arrington, Mary Arrington,  
Mary Borden, Mollie Dewey and  
Hattie Dewey. Misses Arrington will  
visit the Glen Alpine.

Thrashing wheat at the residence of Mr.  
Matthew Jones, Sr., in this county,  
on Monday last, Mr. John H. Edwards,  
a former county commissioner and es-  
teemed citizen, got his right foot en-  
tangled in a wheel, which dislocated  
the ankle. The ends of the condyles of  
the leg bones were badly fractured. Dr.  
Cobb was called in, and relieved the  
sufferer to the extent of medical skill.  
The Dr. thinks he can save the foot, and  
that amputation will not be necessary.
