LOCAL NEWS.

Watermelons and canteloupes are somewhat plentiful but continue high in price.
Steamship *Regulator*, Capt. Doane, cleared and sailed hence this afternoon for New York.
We noticed several excursionists making for DYER's to get a new style crown collar.
Fair weather is what the almanacs and indications promised us yesterday, and fair it was.
There were two interments—one adult and one child—in Pine Forest Cemetery this week.
The Register of Deeds issued but one marriage license this week, which was for a colored couple.

There is gross mismanagement, carelessness or neglect somewhere concerning the lighting of the street lamps. Some are lighted and some are not. We know of one lamp in the eastern part of the city which was lighted only once in two weeks. Some one is to blame in the matter.

The Charlotte *Observer* says: Bishop Northrop, accompanied by his brother, Rev. C. B. Northrop, were in the city yesterday. They left on the afternoon train for Asheville. Rev. C. B. Northrop is pastor of St. Mary's church, in Charleston, and is taking a trip to the mountains for the benefit of his health, which is very feeble.

Exports Foreign.
The Italian barque *Restitute Madra*, Capt. Panseandola, cleared yesterday for Gibraltar, for orders, with 4,720 barrels rosin, valued at \$9,200, shipped by Messrs. Alex. Sprunt & Son.

Will Probably Return.
We understand that Mr. Jno. E. Lippitt, who, with his family, left here a few months ago for New York, where Mr. Lippitt expected to embark in business, is dissatisfied, and speaks positively of returning to Wilmington. They will be welcomed back very gladly by their hosts of friends here.

The River.
Steamer *North State*, Capt. Green, was here yesterday, although she did not come all of the way from Fayetteville. Capt. Green reports a recent rise of four feet, which, however, has since fallen one foot. There is now easy boating water in the river, which will continue only a few days, however, unless there is a reinforcement from rains in the interior.

Since the above was in type the *Murchison*, *Wave* and *Bladen* have all arrived here. The former left Fayetteville last night and confirms previous reports of the river. There was a steady rain last night about half way between this city and Fayetteville but it is not thought that the clouds extended much above that point.

To Leave.
Mr. James A. Willard will leave here to-morrow morning for Baltimore, at which place he will embark in business. He will be joined on the route by Mrs. Willard and the children, who are now on a farewell visit to relatives in Washington, in this State. Mr. Willard has been one of the most enterprising and most respected merchants of Wilmington, and his friends here part with him with great regret. We most cordially wish him prosperity in his new home.

The Homicide.
In the case of Andrew J. Walker, colored, for the shooting of Titus Davis, also colored, an account of which appeared in our columns yesterday, the verdict of the Coroner's jury was that the deceased came to his death from gunshot wounds inflicted from the hands of Andrew J. Walker, colored.
Upon this verdict the Mayor bound the accused over, in the sum of \$1,000, to the next term of the Criminal Court, and to remain in the custody of the Sheriff until the required bail was furnished.

Magistrate's Court.
Mary Eliza Green, colored, was arraigned before Justice Gardner yesterday, charged with perjury, in relation to the case trumped up against Dan. Howard, the jailor. The testimony was such that the examining magistrate bound Mary over in the sum of \$100 for her appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court, in default of which she was committed to jail.

Julia Swann, colored, was next arraigned, upon a charge of the same nature and character, and with precisely the same result, and both damsels now languish behind the walls of their prison cells.

Cotton.
The receipts of cotton at this port for the week ending with yesterday foot up 32 bales, as against 144 bales for the week ending July 18th, of last year, a decrease this week of 112 bales. The receipts for the crop year to date foot up 135,982 bales, as against 118,278 in 1881, an increase this year of 17,704 bales.

Frustrated Attempt.
An attempt, which was happily frustrated, was made to enter the office of Mr. R. W. Hicks, near this office, early yesterday morning. There was a man on top of the office, and he was seen and heard by one of our printers, when officer Gafford was called in, and the printers all turned out to help. The man was heard to jump to the ground, but although a vigorous search was made for him he escaped.

Columbus Endorses Short.
The Columbus county Democratic Convention was held yesterday at Whiteville. We had a reporter on the grounds, but as the Convention had not concluded its labors when the train passed there this afternoon, we have no report as yet of the result, other than that the attendance was very large, and that Col. H. B. Short was endorsed by the Convention as its choice for Congressman from this district.

Fire at Rocky Point.
Early yesterday morning the barn and stables of Mr. Bryant Brown, at Rocky Point, Pender county, were discovered to be on fire, and had acquired such headway that it was impossible to extinguish the flames, and they were entirely consumed, together with a large amount of forage and all the stock of corn and oats remaining from last season's crop. Mr. Brown succeeded in rescuing his horses, though they were badly scorched, with a probable chance of permanent injury. He also saved his carriages. It is impossible to estimate, at present, the amount of Mr. Brown's loss, though it will be quite severe, as we learn that some of the property was insured. The fire was the work of an incendiary.

Excursion on Wednesday.
An excursion will be given to Smithville and the Forts on Wednesday next, the 19th inst., on the *Passport*, under the auspices of the officers and teachers of the St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Sunday School. The boat will leave her wharf at 8:30 o'clock a. m., and refreshments will be served on board at city prices. Messrs. W. H. Strauss, H. B. Eilers, L. Vollers, J. D. H. Klander, Chas. H. Stemmerman and John M. Bremer, Jr., form the committee, and the names of these gentlemen are a sufficient guarantee that no efforts will be spared that will tend to the comfort and enjoyment of all who may attend.

Sanitary.
By reference to our mortuary report for the past week, it will be seen that Wilmington is blessed in the absence of fatal diseases, in a remarkable degree. To chronicle but three interments in one week, in a city with the population we have, and during the heated term, or what is supposed to be the most sickly month in the year, is a very gratifying record to make, and shows, among other things, that the sanitary condition of the city is most carefully and zealously guarded. This is the season of the year when disease generally tells with most fatal effect upon the "little ones," owing to the extreme heat and the injudicious enjoyment of the fruits and vegetables which are now abundant, but this city has thus far escaped.

Railroad Matters.
Mr. Sol Haas, General Freight Agent of the associated railways of Carolina and the Virginias, has been appointed also to the charge of the passenger departments of these lines, which position is to be made vacant by Col. A. Pope's retirement. Mr. Haas will be known as Traffic Manager, and he will have charge of the entire freight and passenger traffic of the associated roads which embrace about twenty lines in all. Mr. Haas has accepted the appointment and the two offices of General Freight Agent and General Passenger Agent, heretofore kept separate and distinct, are to be combined, as we have stated above, under the title of Traffic Managers.

Mr. Haas was here yesterday to confer with Hon. R. R. Bridges, President of the Atlantic Coast Line system. He will assume charge of the passenger departments on the first of August, at which date Col. Pope's resignation is to take effect.
