## LOCAL NEWS.

**The River.** Steamboatmen report that there has been a four foot rise in the Cape Fear, but that it was falling off when the last boats came down. It is presumed that unless the rains of Sunday and yesterday extended well up the country that the rise has been reduced to two feet.

**A New Craft.** The steam tug *Angie & Nellie*, Capt. Dart commanding, from Wilmington, Delaware, to Brunswick, Ga., put in this port yesterday for a harbor. She is a new iron-hull craft, and is fitted up expressly for towing. She is supplied with all modern improvements, and was evidently built for speed and strength. The *Angie & Nellie* will proceed on her voyage as soon as the weather is suitable.

**Kerosene Explosion.** A small colored child, about four or five years of age, a daughter of Nancy Green, who lives near the corner of Sixth and Castle Streets, was badly burned Sunday night. She was coming down steps with a lighted kerosene lamp in her hand, when she stumbled and fell, and the lamp was exploded, throwing the burning oil on her clothing. The child was badly burned before the flames could be suppressed.

**New Regulation.** The new postal regulations which went into effect July 1 require that hereafter an unexpired letter with a 1 or 2 cent stamp affixed, and not having the address of the writer on the envelope, will be detained at the office where it is posted and a notice sent to the person to whom it is addressed, informing him of the fact, and that the letter will be forwarded to him on receipt of the postage due. The former practice was to send unexpired letters, with less than a 3 cent stamp, to the dead-letter office. The new regulation applies to letters directed to some place in the United States from a free delivery office.

**Traffic Manager.** We stated in Sunday's issue that Mr. Sol. Haas, heretofore General Freight Agent of the Associated Railways of Virginia and the Carolinas, had been placed in charge also of the passenger business of these railways, to take effect on the 1st of August, on which date Col. Pope's resignation goes into effect. Mr. Haas' official title to be that of Traffic Manager. **Columbus County Convention.** The delegates from the several townships in Columbus county assembled at Whiteville, on Saturday, the 15th, to elect delegates to the Congressional Convention, to meet at Warsaw on the 20th inst.

A permanent organization was effected by calling Col. T. F. Toon to the Chair. Col. Toon acknowledged the compliment in a very graceful and appropriate speech, which was highly appreciated.

On motion of D. S. Cowan, Esq., one delegate from each township was appointed to form a committee to recommend delegates to the Convention at Warsaw. The following delegates were recommended and endorsed by the Convention:

The following resolutions were introduced by Capt J W Ellis, and ably supported by that gentleman, Capt V V Richardson and D S Cowan, Esq. Their speeches were listened to with marked attention and elicited much applause. These gentlemen contended that while Columbus was always true to the party, and at all times was ready to obey, as she has done, the behest of the party, she was at this late day entitled to reap some of the honors of the victory of the party, to the success of which she had always contributed. The speeches were nevertheless of the strongest character, urging organization and harmony. Indeed there seemed but one sentiment pervading the whole convention: the success of the Democratic party, and the hope that Columbus should name the Congressional candidate at Warsaw.

The following are the resolutions adopted, introduced by Capt. Ellis:

Resolved, That we hereby renew our allegiance and devotion to the principles of free government, as indicated by the time-honored usages of the great Democratic party of the United States.

Resolved: That we think that the constant and increasing majorities given by our county to the candidates of our party from other counties, gives us some claim to recognition; and the time has come for us to present that claim. We are ever ready to vote, but now we ask to divide the honors.

Resolved, That in presenting our claims to the Democracy of our district, and asking the recognition to which we feel we are justly entitled, we present the name of our county-man, Col H B Short, and respectfully ask his nomination as the candidate of the third Congressional district.

Resolved, That in presenting the name of Col. Short, we can say for him that he is a gentleman, well qualified for the position, one who can and will be elected, and when in Congress, by his untiring industry and ability will faithfully represent his constituents, protect and defend their rights and interests, and reflect credit upon our district and State.

Resolved, That our delegates to Warsaw be instructed to cast their ballots for him, and by all honorable means secure his nomination.

Bruce Williams, Esq., being present, was called upon, and made a speech of some length.

On motion of Capt. Ellis, the proceedings were directed to be sent to the DAILY REVIEW and other Democratic papers of the district for publication.

**Skull Crushed In.** Yesterday afternoon, quite a serious clubbing affray took place between two colored boys on the corner of Church and Seventh streets. It seems that the boys, whose names we could not learn, had been quarreling for some time, when the larger one of the two struck the other on the head with a largestick. The stricken boy fell heavily to the ground, and his antagonist ran off. The wounded boy was picked up and sent to his home on Kidder Hill by a drayman. The physician who attended the boy pronounced his skull to be broken.

No tidings of the bodies of the little Bear boys as yet.
