Clinton & Point Caswell R. R.

The meeting called to organize the Clinton & Point Caswell & Wilmington Railroad was held yesterday, at 12 o'clock, in the City Court Room.

It was announced that a large portion of the stock subscribed was represented in person and the balance by proxy. Col. F. W. Kerchner was called to the Chair, and the meeting resolved itself immediately into a company by electing the following gentlemen as a Board of Directors, viz: A. H. Van Bokkelen, J. C. Stevenson, H. Brunhill, R. W. Hicks, A. Adrian, J. A. Ferrell, W. A. Johnson, C. Patrick, M. M. Killeit, J. D. Kerr, F. A. Hawes and R. P. Paddison.

Col. F. W. Kerchner was elected by the stockholders as President of the Company, and Mr. E. W. Kerr and Rev. Colin Shaw were elected Vice-Presidents.

A first call of 5 per cent. of the subscription to the stock was made payable within twenty days.

A charter and plan of incorporation was adopted and the meeting of the stockholders thereupon adjourned.

Upon the adjournment of the above meeting the Board of Directors met and elected Mr. W. B. McKoy as Secretary and Treasurer of the Company, and it was ordered that within thirty days he give a bond of \$10,000.

The Board appointed a committee of three, consisting of Capt. R. P. Paddison and Messrs Jno. D. Kerr and W. A. Johnson to superintend a survey of the line of the proposed road and it was ordered that after they shall have made a survey of the two most practicable routes they shall report the same to the Board.

A committee on by-laws, consisting of Messrs R. W. Hicks, A. H. Van Bokkelen and W. B. McKoy was appointed, with instructions to report to the Board.

An Executive Committee of four Directors is to be appointed by the President to aid and advise him in the furtherance of his labors.

The Board then adjourned, subject to the call of the President.

Sunstrokes and Drowning.

There have been but two cases of sunstroke in the city this season, but lives have been lost by growing and the rules adopted by the New York board of health to prevent such incidents are interesting. Sunstroke is not to be feared if the weather is muggy, and is apt to occur on the second, third or fourth day of a heated term to those working in the sun, and between the hours of 11 A. M. and 4 P. M. On hot days thin clothing and a light hat should be worn. If a feeling of fatigue, dizziness, headache or exhaustion occurs, cease work immediately and lie down in a cool and shady place. Apply cold cloths to and pour cold water over head and neck. A physician should be sent for when any one is overcome by the heat. While waiting for him give the person cool drinks of water or cold black tea or cold coffee, if able to swallow. If the skin is hot and dry, sponge with or pour cold water over the body and limbs, and apply to the head pounded ice wrapped in a towel or other cloth. If there is no ice at hand, keep a cold wet cloth on the head, and pour cold water on it, as well as on the body. If the person is pale, very faint and pulse feeble let him inhale ammonia for a few seconds, or give him a teaspoonful of aromatic spirits of ammonia in two tablespoonfuls of water, with a little sugar. In cases of drowning the work of resuscitation should be commenced at once when the body is grappled out of the water, and should be taken to the nearest dry spot. The body must be exposed freely to the open air. The body should be elevated above the head for a moment only, then it should be placed on some blankets or pieces of clothing, the face upward, and in the open air, if the weather permits; then the mouth and throat should be cleansed by placing the patient gently face downward, with one of the wrists under the forehead. Quickly wipe and cleanse the mouth, and if the patient does not breathe immediately place him on his back, with shoulders raised and supported easily on a pillow or some such support. Let one person at the patient's head grasp the tongue gently and firmly with the fingers, covered with a bit of handkerchief, and draw it out beyond the lips, and then either hold it or press the under jaw up so as to retain the tongue protruding from the mouth; but it is better to hold it in that position with the hand. Then other persons should compress both sides of the chest with the hands applied to the lower ribs slowly and firmly, and then suddenly relax the pressure, repeating this about twenty times a minute. This is to produce and imitate the movements of breathing. The great thing is to get air into the lungs and to keep up artificial respiration. Other movements, such as rolling or rubbing the patient, placing the limbs in certain positions, and using irritants to the nostrils or throat, are recommended.
