CONGRESSIONAL.

(By Telegraph to Daily Review.)

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—The Senate, at 11:30, resumed consideration of the Naval Appropriation bill.

The Printing Committee reported the Senate resolution for printing 5,000 copies of the official report of the International Cotton Exposition of 1881.

Senate bill to provide for the publication of the 10th census, was passed. It provides for the printing of additional copies of reports on population, agriculture, manufacture and mechanics, fish and fisheries and appropriate \$678,000.

The Senate then took up the Naval Appropriation bill and the bill was read for action upon the Committee amendment.

The committee amendment was disagreed to. The bill was proceeded with as in Committee of the Whole. Amendments making changes in respect to the retirement of naval officers and promotions on the retired list and allowing any vacancy among Rear admirals to be filled by the President by the nomination of captains as well as of commodores were accordingly ruled out.

The committee amendment making prohibition against promotions to the grade of commodore immediately operative instead of upon July 1st, 1883, as proposed by the House, was objected to by Mr. Williams and voted down by less than a quorum, 13 to 18.

Various changes by the committee in items of appropriation were agreed to without debate, and Senate amendments were passed over informally.

HOUSE.

After transacting some miscellaneous business, the House, at 12:55, adjourned until Monday.

FOREIGN NEWS.

(By Cable to Daily Review.)

PORT SAID, July 28.—Night.—The Governor and Vice-Governor of Port Said have taken refuge on the fleet, fearing the wrath of Arabi, and the commander of the troops is now acting Governor.

On Wednesday night the inhabitants of the Arab village there, led by fanatical priests, attempted to enter the European portion of the town, but were repulsed by the military.

The following day the French Consul applied to Admiral Conrad for protection for French subjects.

The French Admiral subsequently asked Rear-Admiral Hoskins to make a joint occupation to preserve order, and this was arranged for last night.

When M. DeLesseps suddenly returned from Ismailia, a violent scene occurred between him and the representatives of the French colony.

The consul, M. DeLesseps said, considered Port Said his property; that the consul was a fool for asking for occupation; that it was playing into the hands of England to do so, and that there was no danger, as he had a guarantee of safety for French subjects from the officers commanding the Arab troops.

When evening was ready for landing the French Admiral refused to carry out his part of the arrangement.

DeLesseps visited the Governor and assistant Governor, who were still on board the Mongolia, and Rear-Admiral Hoskins, but failed to bring them to his views.

Reinforcements are arriving every night from Fort Gueheil. The Governor considers the delay in occupying the town will be fatal, as the Arabs are becoming stronger daily.

LONDON, July 28.—Night.—The correspondent of the Times at Alexandria telegraphs as follows: Lord Charles Beresford states that without the assistance of the American marines he would have been unable to discharge the numerous duties of suppressing the fires, preventing looting, burying the dead and clearing the streets.

The House of Commons last evening agreed to the supplementary vote for 10,000 men for the army.

A dispatch to the Manchester Guardian from Alexandria states that persons competent to judge believe that half of the cotton crop of Egypt will be lost, and also the greater part of the wheat crop of Lower Egypt, in consequence of the neglect of irrigation.

Egyptian unified stock has risen 4 points since last evening. Reports are circulated on the Stock Exchange that Arabi Pasha has declared that he will not resist the Turkish troops if they operate without European auxiliaries and that Austria and Germany have all so reverted to the plan of exclusive Turkish intervention.

The British have now 24 guns in position at Ramleh.

The Standard, in an edition just issued, says: Up to the time of going to press no information with regard to Arabi Pasha's offer had been received by the Government.

A dispatch from Alexandria to the Central News states that there will be no cessation of military preparations as it is thought that the offer may be only meant to gain time.
