### THE FOREIGN OUTLOOK.

The present aspect of affairs in Egypt, so far as it relates to the peace of Europe, is not encouraging. There are complications arising every eday, which are continually growing more intricate and menacing, and which threaten to convulse all Europe in war and bloodshed. Diplomacy may possibly smooth over the rugged appearance of the political heavens, but there are conflicting interests at stake-conflicting policies involved-which are becoming daily more conspicuous to the outside observer, and which appear to grow hourly more difficult of a peaceful solution. It would seem, from the dispatches

which reach us, that the policy of England has not been founded in wisdom nor in the interest of peace and good will, but rather upon the principle of establishing her power and control in Egypt, as she has done heretofore in China, the Indies, and other parts of Asia and Africa. This acquisition of territory, of which she is so notoriously fond, is undoubtedly for the benefit of her vast commercial and manufacturing interests, but when it comes in direct antagonism with the best interests of other and equally ambitious nations, opposition may reasonably be expected. Such seems to be the situation at present .-France, and even Germany and Spain, are looking suspiciously at the conduct of England in the matter, and the former power with something more than

It is thought by many-and the opinion is fully warranted by the condition of affairs-that the Khedive is but a cat's paw in the hands of the English, and that he would willingly turn the government of Egypt over to the British were he only well assured of immunity from present or future punishment at the hands of Arabi Pasha and his followers. The dalliance of Turkey is ominous. As all of Europe has had a pick at the "Sick Man," as Turkey has been ironically called, there is not a doubt but that government would feel perfectly reconciled to see her plunderers all "by the ears" on the Egyptian question. 4

Arabi Pasha, the leading and controlling spirit in the rebellion, has proved himself not only a skilful strategic soldier, but a cool, positive, clear-headed and wise politician. With at intimate acquaintance with the country and a marvellous power over the minds and the hearts of his followers, he is capable of causing the Government of England an infinite amount of expense and annoyance, and there is no doubt that he will do all men, will be the Democratic candi-Since his adoption of the green turban and robes of a descendant of the prophet, his influence among the Bedouins, who are mostly Mohammedans, has been complete, and thousands of these nomadic warriors will flock to his standard as a religious obligation and

It would be pleasant to know that all difficulties may be adjusted without a resort to arms, but the prospect is not cheering. England's work is to be entirely up hill. If the question is settled by diplomacy her course is intricate, difficult and perplexing, and if, finally, an appeal to arms is made, she has a formidable antagonist in Arabi Pasha, with a fair prospect that other Euroean powers will interfere to her disad-

### THE NAVY.

According to the latest official report from the Navy Department, says the New York Sun, there are three hundred officers of all grades on the retired list, whose aggregate pay exceeds seven hundred thousand dollars per annum. These beneficiaries render no service to the Government, and the only work they do is to draw seventy-five per centum of full pay. Many of them are actually reciving, after this deduction of twenty-five per centum, nearly double the salary they received when retired.

A system which tolerates barefaced

A system which tolerates barefaced abuses, of which this is a conspicuous example, must be radically wrong, and needs the strong hand of positive correction which Congress alone can admight be used in various branches of the navy, because they are neither mentally nor physically disabled for

But as the service is topheavy, and the younger aspirants for promotion are in the majority, their interests can only be served by retiring seniors compulsory at the age of sixty-two, thus making room for ambition at the expense of the Treasury. Their only object is to get up the ladder as rapidly as possible, without caring who foots the bill, or how much it costs to run the Admiralmaking machine.

The corruption in the administration of the navy, and the enormous cost of maintaining a useless establishment, have for years past been creating a public sentiment that will explode some day in a form of destructive indignation .-Performances like that of Admira Nicholson at Alexandria, will be apt to hasten this desired consideration.
