The evidence is that the little girl was sent to the house of her aunt with a message about 12 o'clock at night on Tuesday last, when she was seized by Rease and carried into the bushes near by where he accomplished his hellish purpose. The little girl's cries of murder woke the people in the neighborhood who went to her assistance. She told her story of the outrage and the culprit was found trying to conceal himself.

Called for the Marines.
A lively skirmish occurred at Smithville on yesterday, in which the assailant used a knife. Our information is to the effect that a man named Kelly owed or had some money belonging to a gentleman, and when asked for it Kelly assailed him with a large knife. Fortunately the attacked escaped unhurt and sent for the constable to arrest Kelly, when he defied the officer and seemed to be on murder intent. In order to arrest the belligerent man the citizens were compelled to send aboard of the revenue cutter Colfax, which was at anchor in the bay, and ask for a squad of men to make the arrest. Lieut. Ross at the head of a squad of marines, came ashore but the man took to the woods before his capture could be perfected.
Since the above was in type, we have heard another version of the row. We could not get a message through last night, and are compelled to give the following as the rumor which seems to be the most authentic, there being some little foundation for it. Yesterday the colored man who stabbed the white man, Grubbs, was being sent to jail in default of bail, when he resisted the officer who had him in charge. The officer summoned some of the citizens to assist him, and the colored men of the town resisted the officer and his deputy. Knives were freely used and several persons were severely cut.
The colored people, it is alleged, swore that if the man was put in jail, they would tear the building down last night and liberate him. Excitement ran high and a riot was imminent. The civil authorities were unable to check it and called on the Revenue Cutter Colfax for assistance. Lieut. Ross, at the head of a squad of armed marines was sent ashore to assist the authorities. The marines were armed with carbines and their presence soon quieted the crowd. The man who was being taken to jail made good his escape, but seven of the ring leaders of the riot were placed in jail. It is said their friends seem to be very outspoken in their determination to liberate them.
LATER—We received a telegraphic message which was to the effect that a riot had existed but everything was then quiet. Further trouble was anticipated but as the Revenue Cutter is lying in the harbor, it would soon be checked.

Capt. V. V. Richardson, Col. H. B. Short, of Columbus, and Messrs. J. G. Kenan, of Duplin, Jas. B. Smith, of Cumberland, and J. A. Farrell, of Sampson, members of the Congressional Executive Committee, arrived here yesterday and last night. They will go to Smithville to-day when a meeting of the committee will be held.
Distinguished Arrivals.
His excellency Gov. Jarvis arrived on the train on the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad last evening at 9:50 o'clock. He was met at the depot by a portion of the reception committee appointed by the Bennett Green Club on Thursday night. He was driven to the Purcell. The remainder of the committee met Col. Green, who arrived on the Steamer D. Murchison at 10 o'clock. Carriages were in waiting to convey Col. Green and daughter to the Hotel. He declined to ride and walked leaning on the arm of Col. H. B. Short, followed by a large number of citizens who had assembled on the wharf to meet him. Gov. Jarvis and Col. Green held a reception in the parlor of the Purcell, and were called on by about one hundred gentlemen. Col. Bennett will arrive by the Carolina Central this morning, and will, with the other gentlemen, go down to Smithville, where they have an appointment to speak to-day.

STATE NEWS.
Charlotte Observer: A new industry in town is the sale of peach seeds. The street gamins gather them up and sell them at the drug stores for 50 cents per thousand seeds.
The Fruit Fair, at Greensboro, bids fair to be well represented by the horticulturists of this State, and extensive preparations have been made for a large display.
Monroe Enquirer: Rev. P. J. Caraway had a very narrow escape from serious injuries on last Tuesday evening. While descending the stairs at his residence he lost his balance at the top-most step and failed to recover though he nearly reached the bottom before falling. His head struck the floor with considerable force and he was otherwise bruised.
News and Observer: Mrs. L. A. Williams died at Warrenton on Monday from an overdose of morphia. Treasurer Neathery tells us that there are now open in this county about 80 public schools. On the nights of the 9th, 10th, and 11th insts., there will be displays of celestial fireworks that never fail in their exhibition. The earth then plunges through the broad domains of an erratic number of the system known as the August meteor-zone.

Charlotte Home and Democrat: That Charlotte is infested with a band of thieves and burglars no one can doubt, as it is of frequent occurrence of some place having been plundered. On Monday night the kitchen of Mrs. Drucker was robbed of what supplies the thieves could find. Mrs. Gallman suffered in like manner, where they obtained a small quantity of provisions. In accordance with their usual preliminary, they first entered Mr. Wilson's carriage shop to supply themselves with what tools they thought would prove useful. They endeavored this time to carry off some goods, but left them, being frightened probably.

Chatham Record: On last Tuesday Henry Oakley killed W. N. Cassidy, near Ferrington's mill, in this county. They were white men from Person county employed by Mr. John W. Atwater in the cultivation of tobacco. No person witnessed the homicide, and all that is known about it was told by Oakley. He stated that they met near Mr. Atwater's residence, and after exchanging a few words, began to quarrel and he stabbed Cassidy twice, who immediately fell. On last Monday a most wonderful surgical operation was performed in this county by Doctors Budd, Lasater, Ivey, Manning and H. T. Chapin. It was the successful removal of a five-pound fibroid tumor of the uterus with all its appendages from the body of a daughter of Mr. Oran Williams. It has been raining every day this week, and on Tuesday afternoon there was the heaviest fall of rain that has almost ever been known here.

Fayetteville Examiner: We learn that the laborers employed by the Government in improving the Cape Fear River between this place and Wilmington, have been required by Hubbard, the tax gatherer of the Republican party, to contribute a portion of their hard earnings to the campaign fund. We understand a company is organized in this place with sufficient capital to go into the manufacture of cotton seed oil, the ginning of cotton, and the making of fertilizers for corn, cotton, tobacco, &c. We wish them success. There will be a meeting of the Directors of the C. F. & Y. V. Railway at Greensboro on the 10th inst. It has been called by President Gray, who seeks occasion to explain fully to the Directors certain negotiations recently perfected greatly to the advantage of the Company. About six o'clock yesterday evening the drying house connected with Mr. J. D. Smith's saw mill in this town, took fire and was partly consumed.
