THE NEGRO COUNTIES.

The News and Observer has obtained from the office of the Secretary of State, the population of the several counties in the State, white and colored, which we print below, and which will be found valuable for reference by campaigners and others. It appears that there were in 1880 twenty-one counties having clear negro majorities, as follows: Anson, Bertie, Bladen, Caswell, Chowan, Craven, Edgecombe, Franklin, Granville, Greene, Halifax, Hertford, Jones, Lenoir, New Hanover, Northampton, Pasquotank, Pender, Pitt, Richmond, and Warren .-Since then, by cutting off a part of Wake, that county adds another to the black list; and Vance county makes another. Besides, Robeson, in 1880, had but four white majority, which has doubtless since been lost. So, without donbt, to-day there are twenty-four countles where the negro population is in excess of the whites. Besides, Martin, Perquimans, Washington and Wayne are just on the border line, and the outlook is that they will soon become negro counties also. It must be remembered that the census of 1870 was but imperfectly taken; that the negroes increase naturally in the eastern counties faster than the whites there; and that there is a considerable influx into Eastern Carolina of Virginia negrees. We must look at this matter as it really is, not as we might wish it to be. There are twenty-four counties in the State where the negroes are in the majority. We give the figures from the census returns:
