Wilmington Cotton Mills. We were shown through the Wilmington Cotton Mills yesterday by Mr. Walter G. McRae, the affable Secretary and Treasurer, and were surprised to see the proficiency of the hands, about 120 in number, and the excellent quality of print cloths turned out. The mill is situated on Surry, between Wooster and Dawson streets. The main building is 107 feet long by 75 feet in width and is three stories high. It was built in 1874, expressly for the manufacture of print cloths, and is the only mill of the kind in the South. The machinery of the mill is run by a Harriss-Corliss

engine of 100 horse power. On the first floor is the spinning room, in which are 27 Ring spinning frames, which holds 5,508 spindles. A steam elevator takes you to the second floor, on which is the card room and picker room. The company are now putting in a new Kitson picker, which has all the latest improvements, including a "Lord evener." Adjoining the picker room is now being erected a mixing room of sufficient size in which to mix thirty bales of cotton. The third story contains 156 print cloth looms, which are nicely arranged and present a very busy scene when running. About 24 bales of cotton are consumed daily and the mill turns out 6,000 yards of cloth. The cotton used in the mill turns out about three times the amount of cloth made in homespun mills by reason of the fineness of the thread spun from it. The operators are now all skilled hands and the cloths turned out are second to none in the country. The mill has been running on full time from the start,
