A white man, calling himself Geo. Harris, has been trying to play some sharp practice on Messrs. Behrends & Munroe, of this city. He came here about three weeks ago and put up at a private boarding house, on Front street. trees and fences and blew down a cabin About a week ago he stopped in at Messrs. Behrends & Munroe's furniure store and stated that he was a ship-carpenter and had come to this city from Newbern, where he had been working for some time. Behrends & Munroe refused to do, but gave him their check for the balance with the understanding that it should be dated the fortable working and sleeping. Several gentlemen residents in Pender county were speaking a few days since at Burgaw about the scuppernong vines in that county, when in the course of conversation, it was developed that the first vine known of in the limits of the present county was at one time growing on the plantation of Mr. Amos Wooten, in Holly Shelter, not far from Onslow line. The next oldest was at the Robert Sharpless place, not from Bannerman's Bridge.-Both of these vines are now dead .-From the Wooten vine a cutting was taken and planted at Dr. R. T. Sanders' place, about four miles East of Burgaw, where it is now bearing luxuriantly. This is, probably, the largest scuppernong vine in this section of the State, as it measures 34 inches in circumference at the base. The vine has been bearing ever since 1844.
