#### Mass Meeting.

A Democratic Mass Meeting will be held at Leesburg, in Pender county, on next Saturday, the 16th inst. Among the distinguished speakers invited and expected Col. B. R. Moore, of this city, and John D. Stanford, Esq., of Duplin, will positively attend and address the crowd. A similar meeting will be held at Rocky Point depot on Saturday, the 30th inst.

#### False Pretense.

Jesse Macks, colored, is wanted for obtaining goods under false pretenses. He called at a restaurant yesterday and stated that he had a flat-load of wood in the hands of Mr. John C. Heyer, and he wanted to get a meal and would pay for it when the wood was sold. It was subsequently found out that Macks had no wood and that he had come here with the circus.

#### Not Sustained.

Capitola Brown was arrested yesterday on the charge of larceny. She was accused of stealing \$5 from a man who left Barrett's show. The evidence was not sufficient to convict her and the showman had to pay the cost in the case. It seems that the man was drunk and could not give a very distinct account of himself, or the manner in which he lost the money.

#### Bound Over.

The man, George Harris, (no relation) who was arrested on the charge of forgery, on Tuesday last, had a preliminary examination yesterday. He was committed to jail in default of bond for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court. The man is evidently not a sharper, for the reason that his forgeries were too bunglingly done. He has a wife and child here and it is thought that he was driven to the deed by want.

#### Wilmington Light Infantry.

We are glad to hear that this veteran organization is now in a more prosperous and flourishing condition than it has been in for years. There are forty odd members, all of whom now have uniforms. There are also a number of applications for membership pending and Col. Cantwell states that uniforms can now be provided for seven or eight, in addition to the number who are already uniformed.

#### Sent to Jail.

"Dr." J. W. Wilber, the Liverpool cotton broker, who had a preliminary hearing before Justice Gardner on Tuesday, on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, was committed to jail yesterday in default of his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court. It would stand the "Doctor" well in hand to unearth some of the U. S. bonds he claims to possess and free himself. The fellow is undoubtedly a crank.

#### At Federal Point.

The tides at Federal Point on Sunday were the highest ever known there. The rocks were entirely covered and the water ran over most of the point. The fish nets, etc., on Zeke's Island, owned by Messrs W. E. Davis & Son, were anchored on what has heretofore been called dry land, to keep them from floating off. A sharpie, belonging to them was turned over and was somewhat damaged.

#### A Crane and a Terrapin.

A party of gentlemen who were strolling on the outskirts of the city on last Sunday discovered a large white crane on the edge of a small pond evidently trying to fly, but could not. They went to investigate the matter and ascertained that one of the bird's feet was held by a large snapping terrapin. The crane was lifted out of the water but the terrapin kept his hold. The bird and terrapin were brought to the city.

#### Day of Atonement.

The feast observed by our Jewish citizens as "Yom Kippur" or Day of Atonement, falls due to-morrow, the 15th inst. It is their great fast day, for twenty-four hours. The fast is complete, not even water being allowed. It begins at sunset this afternoon, and with solemn ceremonies. The belief is that "Bosh Hasbanah," the new year which began yesterday afternoon at 6 o'clock, closes the year's record and thence to "Yom Kippur," angels scan and dispute the record, but on that day the status of every Hebrew is fixed for the New Year. From the services of that day every Jew is believed to go forth with a conscience pure toward God, having forgiven all enemies and sought also God's forgiveness for all transgressions. In a newness of spirit, reconciled to both God and his fellow-men, he closes the solemnity of "Yom Kippur," which begins with a religious service. The observance of the day is derived from the commandment of the Lord in the 23d chapter of Leviticus. It will be strictly observed in this city by those of the Jewish faith. All business will be suspended from sunset this afternoon until sunset to-morrow. Services will be held to-morrow in the Temple of Israel, which will be open throughout the day, beginning at 10 o'clock.

#### At Chapel Hill.

Mr. Sol. Weill, son of Mr. A. Weill, of this city, who graduated some time since at a college in Cincinnati, is now at Chapel Hill for the purpose of taking a legal course. We saw a letter from him yesterday and inasmuch as his impressions of the University of North Carolina are interesting we have obtained permission to make some extracts from the letter. Mr. Weill speaks first of the beautiful location and the healthfulness of the village and then goes on to state that there are about 250 students there now, gathered from all portions of the State. He thinks that the University, under its present able administration, assisted by the learned faculty, is fast reassuming its old-time prestige and will in a few years be able to compete with the most celebrated institutions of learning in the country. He speaks of the severe and searching examination to which he was subject and says that if any one who contemplates entering this seat of learning thinks for a moment that this will be a mere formality he may as well disabuse his mind at once of such an impression. Mr. Weill's entrance examination was of the hardest. He was examined in Greek nearly four hours, in mathematics nearly three hours and in Latin and other branches as searchingly. This, of course, elevates the standard of study and hard work is necessarily the line of every student who hopes to excel.

#### The New Market Purchased.

We understand that the negotiations which have been pending for some time past between the city authorities and the owners of the new market houses have been brought to a satisfactory conclusion. The Committee on the part of the city, Mr. William Calder, from the Board of Audit and Finance, and Alderman W. H. Chadbourne, from the Board of Aldermen, have finally agreed for the purchase with the Board of Directors of the Wilmington Market Company. The terms have been settled upon and it only remains for the purchase of the property to approve the action of its Directors. The property consists of the large brick market building and site, on South Front street, near Orange, with the frame fish market and site on the wharf at its foot, and the large frame market building and site on the corner of Fourth and Campbell streets.

The price agreed upon is \$30,000, payable at the option of the city at any time within 20 years, with interest at 6 per cent. The cost of the property two years ago is said to have been \$44,000, with expenses since then carrying the amount up to a total of \$51,000. The committee, before deciding upon this purchase, made inquiries and estimates as to the cost of similar sites and buildings in other localities and decided, after long deliberation, that it was for the best interest of the city to make a purchase of the buildings already erected and a full statement of the transaction will be published by them as soon as the transfer has been completed. One object in view has been to make the purchase previous to the first of October so that such of the dealers as desire to rent stalls in the new markets may not encumber themselves with rent of store property for another year. The idea advanced is that no coercion

shall be used in inducing the butchers to occupy the markets, but that the stalls shall be rented on the first day of October for one year from next January, possession to be given at once with free rent until January, the only requirement being that the stalls be occupied at once. It is possible also that, with the same object in view, free shelter may be given for some time to the market carts under the sheds surrounding the market on South Front street.

We regret to learn that there was not as large an attendance yesterday on the excursion given on the *Passport* for the benefit of the Ladies' Benevolent Society as the merits of the occasion demanded.
