To Prevent Silverware from Tarnishing.
Solid silverware, as well as plated goods, grows dark and tarnished in a very short time when exposed to the air, and even when put away in a dark place. This is especially the case where hard coal is used in the house or neighborhood, as the sulphur in the coal, liberated by heat, is sure to stain all the silverware within reach. This annoying tarnishing can be entirely prevented by painting the silverware with a soft brush dipped in alcohol, in which some colloid has been dissolved. The liquid dries immediately and forms a thin, transparent and absolutely invisible coating upon the silver, which completely protects it from all effects of the atmosphere, etc. It can be removed at any time by dipping the article in hot water. This recipe has been in use for some time in the large establishments at London, where most of the goods in the show-cases are protected in this manner.

Steamship Benefactor.
The following in reference to the disabling of the steamship *Benefactor* we clip from Thursday's issue of the *Norfolk Virginian*: "The steamship *Benefactor*, of the Clyde Line, plying between New York and Wilmington, N. C., came into this port yesterday morning in distress in tow of a tug. Captain Tribon, of the steamship, reports that when off Winter Quarter shoal Sunday night, going South, the cylinder head of the engine blew out. The escape of steam was very rapid and in great volume, severely scalding Messrs. William Stewart and Philippe Desjardins, the chief engineer and his second assistant. The vessel was at once put under sail and proceeded thus for some time, when she was taken in tow by the steamer *Richmond*, of the Old Dominion Line, and brought into Hampton Roads, whence she was brought to this city as above stated.

As soon as the vessel arrived here the wounded men were carried to the Hospital St. Vincent de Paul for treatment. They are both badly scalded from their waists up and it is probable their injuries are dangerous."

Strictly Business.
Mr. C. B. Bishop, the inimitable comedian, supported by Miss Rose Osborne and the most powerful company which has ever traveled with him will open the theatrical season in this city this afternoon with a matinee at 2 o'clock, the price of admission being placed at 50 and 24 cents. The play "Strictly Business," is one of A. C. Gunter's master pieces. Speaking of Mr. Bishop the *Richmond Whip* says:

"Bishop—'Old Bish'—whose name is as familiar to the Richmond public as household words, and whose person is as well known and easily recognized as the Washington monument, made his appearance here last night in a frothy character, entitled *Phenias Pomey Philkins*, in a new comedy by A. C. Gunter, called 'Strictly Business.' After the audacity which a few days ago made use of the *Czar of Russia* as an advertising medium we were prepared for fun—and we got it in good fat lumps. The part of Philkins gives Bishop a chance to revel in all the round, jolly, unctuous merit for which he is celebrated; indeed, so accurately does it fit him, and so nicely is it suited to all his characteristics that we can easily imagine the author and the actor sitting side by side and jointly concocting a scheme to capture the laughter from the public *vi et armis*. We are familiar with some of Mr. Gunter's works—we have seen and laughed at his 'Fresh'—his 'D. A. M.' produced originally in Richmond, we thought a well-conceived work; but nothing that he has heretofore written will compare with 'Strictly Business' in that great object of comedy—raising a hearty and healthful laugh. The story is novel, well thought out, and admirably treated; the unities out, and admirably preserved; the plot of the fable are well preserved, the consistency carried out with remarkable consistency, and the fun is not lagged in by the head and shoulders, but flows free, and generous as molasses from the bung-hole of a barrel.

Bishop was really immense. To use a trite phrase, the cheek, self-reliance and conscious power of the commercial traveller were all faithfully portrayed. The character was never lost sight of for a moment; indeed, we have seldom seen an actor so thoroughly lose sight of his own identity and invest himself so completely with his part as Bishop does in 'Phenias.' We congratulate mutually the author and the actor. The first for having made an important addition to the dramatic literature of his country, and the actor for having added one more to that long list of laughable impersonations that have delighted the public for more than two decades. If we were inclined to prophesy, we might say that Bishop's Philkins will take rank with 'Bip Van Winkle,' 'Dundreary,' 'Kit, the Arkansas Traveller,' and any or all of the strong and peculiar dramatic creations with which we are familiar.
