## Strictly Business.

Mr. C. B. Bishop was greeted last  
evening by the largest Saturday night  
audience we have ever seen in the

## THE CAMPAIGN.

Yesterday in the District—Col.  
Green and Capt. Galloway  
at Clinton and Col. Moore  
at Leesburg.

There was a large attendance yester-  
day at Clinton and at Leesburg to hear  
the issues of the campaign discussed.  
Col. Green and Capt. Galloway spoke  
at the former place and Col. B. R.  
Moore at the latter. We present below  
special reports from both points:

LEESBURG, Pender Co., Sept. 16, 1882.  
EDITOR REVIEW:

It had been made public for a week  
or more past that a mass meeting of  
the Democracy would be held here to-  
day. This drew a fine crowd, as the  
people are getting stirred up on politics.  
It was expected that the nominee of  
our party in Duplin for the Legislature,  
Mr. John D. Stanford, would speak,  
but he failed to put in an appearance.  
This narrowed down the speaking to  
Col. B. R. Moore, of Wilmington, who  
had been properly invited. The Colo-  
nel made one of the best speeches thus  
far of the campaign. He handled the  
Republican party with gloves off; and  
contended that the Liberal party was  
but a part and parcel of the old Re-  
publican party. He went into national  
as well as State issues, and spoke with  
much ability on the questions of county  
government, internal revenue, tariff,  
matters of education, &c. now before  
the people.

Col. Moore is evidently of that much-  
needed order of Democratic leaders who  
are bold and reliable as well as pro-  
gressive and orthodox. He did not con-  
fine himself to the old ruts of thought in  
his able speech, but he ventured upon  
newer ground of his own choosing and  
newer ground of his own choosing. He  
demands that the legislative enactments  
for the education of the races in North  
Carolina should be, as a matter of justice,  
changed entirely. His proposition is  
that each race shall educate its own  
children; that taxes for public schools  
for colored children shall be collected  
out of the colored race alone and that  
school taxation for white children shall  
be levied alone on the whites. This is  
the first time any man in our State has  
publicly taken this new and aggressive  
position. He cited Kentucky and other  
States where this new doctrine is State  
law. The question is an important one  
and is destined to force itself upon pub-  
lic thought and attention. Tax payers  
here approve the proposed change.

A CITIZEN.

CLINTON, N. C., Sept. 16, 1882.  
EDITOR REVIEW:  
Several hundred of the voters of  
Sampson county were addressed here  
to-day by Capt. Swift Galloway, the  
distinguished Solicitor of the 3rd Judicial  
District, and candidate for re-election.

and Col. Wharton J. Green, the Demo-  
cratic candidate for Congress from  
this district. Capt. Galloway was in-  
troduced by D. B. Nicholson, Esq., and  
for an hour or more, held the close at-  
tention of his audience, while he dealt  
what he termed the arch-enemy of North  
Carolina, the Republican party, heavy  
and irresistible blows. The Captain's  
speech will do much good. He is  
quite popular here and will receive a  
very large vote in the county. At the  
close of his speech, Col. Green was in-  
troduced in a few felicitous remarks by  
M. C. Richardson, Esq. The Colonel  
had never appeared before the people  
of Sampson, but he will not be a stran-  
ger hereafter to those who heard him  
to-day.

Though suffering under great physi-  
cal discomfort, he made a masterly  
speech, thoroughly discussing all the  
main issues of the day. Space and  
time will allow no attempt at an an-  
alysis of his remarks. He was specially  
happy in his lucid explanation of the  
burdens our people are bearing under  
the present tariff system and in his de-  
nunciation of the internal revenue sys-  
tem. The Colonel made a fine impres-  
sion and Sampson will roll up her full  
Democratic majority for him in No-  
vember. Both he and Capt. Galloway  
will make several other speeches in the  
county. The Democracy of Sampson  
are alive to the situation. Earnest  
work is already being done. The coun-  
ty will be thoroughly canvassed and the  
townships well organized.
