## SPEAKING LAST NIGHT.

### A Large Assemblage to Listen to the Able Address of Col. Jno. N. Staples, of Greensboro.

A very large assemblage gathered around the stand on Third, between Dock and Orange streets, last night, to hear Col. Jno. N. Staples, of Greensboro. The speaker is a gentleman of a fine and commanding presence and was introduced to his audience in a terse little speech by Mr. Thos. W. Strange. Col. Staples, on taking the stand, opened his speech with an anecdote and soon won the respect and attention of his large audience, which is variously estimated at from 700 to 1,000. In justice to Col. Staples we will not attempt a review of his able arguments. There is but one expression of sentiment in regard to the speech and that is that it was one of the very best ever delivered in this city. He spoke for about two hours and was asked to "go on" when he signified his intention of bringing his speech to a close. He showed up the iniquities of the corrupt Republican party since they have been in power, both in the National and State Governments, and proved that the "Liberal" alias Oleomargarine party was but a branch of the Republican vine. He touched on the Prohibition question and stoutly denied that it was anything but a question of morality and temperance, but said if our opponents wanted to make it a political issue they are at liberty to do so. For, said he, the Democratic party has a record on it which they are willing to stand by. He said the memorials containing 300,000 names, asking for a Prohibition bill, were presented to the General Assembly and were pressed by the clergy, laity and over 250,000 citizens as no bill was ever pressed before. He further stated that the Democratic party, not wishing to curtail the rights or privileges of the people of the State, peremptorily refused to pass a prohibition bill, making it by enactment of the General Assembly a law; but presented to the people of the State a bill for them to ratify or reject. The sovereign people voted it down with a majority of 117,000, and he asked those present if they thought the Democrats would try and secure a sumptuary law in the face of the facts before them, when a Democratic Legislature refused to pass a bill praying for by 300,000 people before submitting it to the popular vote. He referred to the internal improvements since the party of good government came into power in this State. He cited the building of railroads, the ten Normal schools—five of which are for the whites and five for the colored people. The Insane Asylums at Goldsboro and Morganton, and other improvements and challenged any of the Republican orators to point out one mile of railroad which was built under Republican rule or to show that even one brick was laid in the erection of schools of learning.

Mr N A McLean, Chairman of the Robeson County Democratic Executive Committee, called the Convention to order. Mr E D Meares, of Columbus, and Mr D W Millsaps of Robeson, were appointed a Committee on Credentials. The roll of Townships was called. All the Townships of Columbus represented except Waccamaw and Western Springs, and all of Robeson except Blue Springs. It was moved and carried that a committee consisting of three representatives from Robeson and three from Columbus be appointed on permanent organization. The Chair then appointed the following: From Columbus, Messrs. D P High, J P Faulk and Emanuel Wright. From Robeson, Messrs. J C Atkinson, A W Fuller and J B McCallum, Sr. The Committee then reported the following permanent officers: Chairman, Samuel F McDaniel, of Columbus.
