At 9 o'clock yesterday morning Miss Bradley opened her school, with the Lord's Prayer which, was repeated by about 550 children, 225 being the pupils of last year, and 325 new pupils After prayer was said Miss Bradley delivered a short, but one of the most sensible addresses it has ever been our good for. and general management of the school. She congratulated the children on the beautiful day, and alluded in a most feeling and impressive manner to the only death that had taken place among her little flock since the beginning of the last scholastic year, which moistured many an eye with tears for the departed companion. We have rarely listened to a more sensible and well-directed Board of County Commission

Miss Bradley said every child would find the motto of the school in each room, which is as follows:

"Look up, Not down! Look out, Not in? Look forward, Not back! Lend a hand! Put yourself in his place."

Miss Bradley then enjoined upon the children the rules by which the school would be governed, which are too numerous to mention, but one or two struck us with force as being most excellent, and which, if enforced by our No pupil is allowed to chalk the fences or any part of the building. No pupil is allowed to bring marbles to school. At this juncture many a hand doubtless went at once to the breeches pocket of many a youngster present.

GOVERNMENT OF THE SCHOOL.

Miss Bradley said that "moral suasion was her invariable plan and rule to govern children, and that if parents expected with her corps of assistants to use the rod they would be sadly mis-

There were many parents present to hear Miss Bradley's address and we think there was but one opinion expressed about it and that was, it was very impressive and to the point, so that neither pupil or parent could misunderstand. Miss Bradley is assisted by the following able corps of teachers: Mrs. Mary E. Russell and Misses Atta S. Nutter, Josephine Folger, Mary L. Alderman, Ida Farns, Minnie Bogart and Emma McDougall, with Miss Amey as general superintendent of the whole.

Hour for opening the school: At 8:30 o'clock the gate is opened; at 8:45 o'clock the school is opened; at 9 o'clock the gate is shut. Punctuality was enjoined and implicit obedience to rules and regulations. Wilmington owes Miss Bradley a debt of gratitude for the establishment of this school which she most unhesitatingly declares is for those who are unable to pay for it rather than those who can afford.


