1st. We have been informed that one or two members of this Board are pecuniarily interested, either directly or indirectly, in the property; which, if so, in our opinion, would invalidate have stood the storms of many winters the purchase. Article VII, section 7: "No county, city, town, or other municipal corporation shall contract any debt, pledge its faith, or loan its credit, nor shall any tax be levied, or collected, by any officers of the same, except for the necessary expenses thereof, unless by a vote of a majority of the qualified voters
