The work of demolishing the old Poor House on Walnut street, between Fourth and Fifth, was begun yesterday, the same having been condemned as unsafe by the city authorities.

There were three Fayetteville steamers here yesterday, the *D. Murchison*, the *Wave*, and the *North State*, but only the latter was in on her regular trip day. The river continues very low.

The St. James' Mission School opened yesterday morning at the Home with 76 scholars, and 2 others to be added to-day, making 78 in all. Hector Davis, a well known colored man, died very suddenly yesterday at his house in the lower part of the city. He was alive and well yesterday morning and at 12 o'clock he was dead. His death resulted from natural causes and there was no call for the services of a coroner.

Found Dead in Bed.

Mrs. Mary Curtis, an old white lady, was found dead in bed yesterday morning at her house on Tenth, between Chestnut and Mulberry Streets. Dr. D. M. Buie, Acting Superintendent of Health, made an examination and is satisfied that death resulted from paralytic causes. Mrs. Curtis was 68 years of age.

A Fracas.

A gentleman who was passing at the time informs us that a fracas occurred last night in a barber shop near the corner of Front and Castle Streets, between two colored individuals, whose names he did not learn, nor the cause of the quarrel. One of the men knocked the other down with a chair and the latter seemed badly hurt. There were no arrests, so far as we have been able to learn.

No Transit Yesterday.

Yesterday was not the date of the transit of Venus as many erroneously thought; that interesting event is set for the 6th day of next December. The impression got abroad here that the transit would take place yesterday and many eyes were in consequence turned heavenward in search of the event. The only discovery made, however, was the presence of the young moon and Venus, the morning star, about two degrees West of the moon, both of which were seen very plainly in the bright sunlight.

Terrible Accident.

A colored man by the name of Andrew Hill, hailing from Old Town, in Brunswick county, was at Messrs. E. Kidder & Son's mill yesterday and met there with a fearful accident. He was passing by one of the swinging saws, used to trim boards, when his right arm was caught in the saw and fearfully lacerated. The cut was below the elbow and the arm was so badly mangled that amputation was afterwards found necessary. The unfortunate man was taken to the City Hospital where the operation was performed.

We are informed that if Hill had obeyed the instructions given him in regard to leaving the mill the accident would not have occurred. He was told by a white man in charge of that department to go out by a different way but he went by the saw and has paid dearly for his temerity.

The Revival at Fifth Street.

A great deal of interest is being manifested in the revival now in progress in Fifth Street Church. Rev. T. Page Ricard, the Pastor, is assisted by Rev. Mr. Mendenhall, a Quaker revivalist, and these two divines are laboring earnestly for the spiritual welfare of their fellow-men. There are many penitents at the altar each night and a number of conversions have been made. On Sunday night the Church was crowded, almost to suffocation, even standing room being in demand. Thirteen penitents were at the altar on that occasion. Services continue to be held nightly and the interest felt promises to continue unabated for some time to come.

An Apple to the Inch.

A young lady in Sampson county, Miss Lou Davis, has sent us two bunches of apples which grew on the farm of her uncle, Mr. M. M. Killett, a few miles from Clinton. They are winter apples, and there were six apples on one bunch and sixteen on the other. The latter bunch was only about sixteen inches in length, which is an apple to the inch. It is ahead of anything of the kind we have ever yet seen, but old Sampson will do even better than that when she gets the railroad built up to Clinton from Point Caswell. Death of Coroner Hewlett.

We regret to learn of the death of Mr. E. D. Hewlett, Coroner of the county, which occurred at his residence in this city, corner of Seventh and Queen streets, yesterday afternoon, at 4 o'clock. Coroner Hewlett was taken sick on Friday night and rapidly grew worse, his death being caused by congestion of the brain. There was an erroneous rumor afloat yesterday, that he was asphyxiated from inhaling poisonous gases emanating from a decomposing body, but such was not the case. Coroner Hewlett was a native of this county and will be buried this forenoon in the family burying ground at Masonboro Sound. He was brother to Mr. Elijah Hewlett and was, we think, about 50 years of age. He has been Coroner of the county ever since the Reconstruction days, having been elected continuously on the Republican ticket.

"My God, Fellow Citizens!"

Captain (or is it Major?) Charles Price, recently a Democrat, (and a "Bourbon" at that) and Speaker of the House of Representatives, unburdened himself last night at a stand erected at the head of the old market site, of the great speech which has for a week past been promised the Coalitionists in this city. There was a pretty respectable crowd present (in point of numbers) but it dwindled down to a handful before Mr. Price closed. He was introduced by Judge Russell who, rather unkindly, we thought, took advantage of the occasion to make quite a lengthy speech himself, thereby taking some of the wind out of Capt. Charles's sails. At the conclusion of Judge Russell's tariff talk, Sheriff Manning proposed three cheers for Mr. Price and then the orator straightened himself out and settled down to business. He spoke for two mortal hours and when he got through everybody but one man, and that man was Charles Price, was thoroughly tired out.

A Celebrated Case.

Those who were not present at the performance at the Opera House last evening missed the best entertainment we have had here this season. There was a really fine audience present but if a more extended notice had been given there is no doubt but that nearly every seat in the house would have been occupied. Mr. O'Neill is an actor of great merit and he is sustained by an excellent company. The piece last night was well presented and drew largely upon the sympathies and feelings of the appreciative audience. So thoroughly was this the case, in fact, that at the close of the first act, when is presented one of the most powerful scenes of the play, the audience were so thoroughly in accord with the spirit of the scene that they sat enthralled as the curtain fell and forgot the applause which was the actor's meed.

Mr. O'Neill's conception of the character of Jean Renaud was very fine, and was all that could be desired. It would be difficult for one to conceive a more perfect rendition. Mr. J. T. Malone was excellent as the faithful Irish soldier and servant, Dennis O'Rourke; whilst Mr. Thos. F. McCabe, as "Count and Duke D'Aubeterre," displayed a fine conception of the part, and gave evidence of forcible acting. Miss Clara Baker, in the dual role of "Madeline Renaud" and "Valentine De Morney," was very acceptable. The same may be said of Miss Rillie Deaves as "Adrienne." Miss Jean Clara Walters is undoubtedly a fine actress. Mr. J. M. Frelour, to whom is as-

signed the villain's part, plays to the life roles which never call for sympathy or praise.
