

### Exports Foreign.

Austrian barque *Sospir*, Capt. Vacasovich, cleared yesterday for Trieste, Austria, with 3,200 barrels rosin, valued at \$6,450, shipped by Messrs. Alex. Sprunt & Son.

### In Distress.

The Danish brig *Don 2 den April*, Capt. Sorensen, from Savannah for Rotterdam, with a cargo of rosin, arrived here yesterday in distress having sprung a leak in the very heavy weather which has prevailed off the coast.

### Magistrate's Court.

Sandy Stewart, colored, was before Justice Gardner yesterday, charged with harboring and secreting deserting sailors. He was found guilty and adjudged to pay a fine of \$30 and the costs, failing in which he was committed to jail.

### The Vacancy.

We understand that no one has yet been appointed to fill the vacancy caused by Coroner Hewlett's death and that it is possible there may be no appointment at all, as the election is so near at hand. The appointing power is in the hands of the Clerk of the Superior Court. It will be necessary for the Republicans to fill the vacancy on their ticket.

### Fine Mulletts.

Mr. George Rogers, of Middle Sound, had in market yesterday afternoon a lot of as pretty mulletts as were ever seen hereabouts. They were known as the red-roo mullet and some of them weighed from 5 to 6 1/2 pounds each. Mr. Rogers caught 200 bunches of these fish yesterday morning in the Sound. They sold rapidly.

### Reduced Money Tariff.

The Southern Express Company have adopted a reduced money tariff which most prove very popular. In small currency remittances the following sums will be transmitted at the rates named: \$30 and under, 15 cents; over \$30 to \$40, inclusive, 20 cents; over \$40 to \$50, inclusive, 25 cents; over \$50 to \$75, inclusive, 40 cents. The Post Office Department must now look to its laurels.

### Dangers of Running Up Stairs.

A New York physician thinks there is a connection between hastily ascending stairs and heart disease. He says: "The greatest care is necessary in this matter for people with any heart trouble, either latent or developed. There certainly are among our business and professional men many afflicted with some form of heart trouble which has often been induced by severe attacks of rheumatism or kidney disease. I have not known a case of heart disease that was attributable alone to ascending stairs. Of course, the first effect of running or rapidly ascending is shortness of breath. That means the legs and arms are moving rapidly, while the motion of the heart, not having caught up, is slower. So a load of blood from the limbs is suddenly thrown upon the heart before it begins to move rapidly enough to dispose of it. This undue burden suddenly put on the heart, and the temporary congestion of the lungs, cause imperfect action on their part, and we experience what is known as shortness of breath. This is what every one has felt after running up the street to catch a train. But if the heart is perfectly sound, this exertion will not cause disease. But persons with weak hearts should go very carefully."
