LOCAL NEWS.

Magistrate's Court.
Mary Lewis, colored, charged with an assault and battery on Walter Scott, also colored, was found guilty, but judgment was suspended on payment of the costs.
A white sailor was found guilty of an assault and battery on Fannie McDonald, colored, and in his case also, judgment was suspended upon the payment of costs.

The Vacancy.
We are informed that the appointment of a successor to Coroner Hewlett does not lie in the office of the Clerk of the Superior Court, as stated by us yesterday, but in the Board of County Commissioners. It is not likely that the vacancy will be filled by the Commissioners, however, as the election is so near at hand, but in case of the services of a Coroner being required in the interval, a *pro temp.* appointment will be made by the Clerk of the Superior Court.

A False Report.
Capt. T. H. W. McIntire, formerly of Pender county, but now of Laflore county, Miss., writes to beg us to give an emphatic denial to a report that Capt. McIntire understands has been in circulation in Pender, Duplin and Sampson counties to the effect that his oldest son, Allie, had killed a man in Mississippi and had been condemned therefore. We had not heard the report. At Capt. McIntire's request we cheerfully state that the report is wholly without foundation and that there is not, in fact, one word of truth in it.

The citizens of Wilmington are promised some good speaking next week. Gen. E. W. Moise, of South Carolina, a gifted and eloquent son of our sister State, will speak on next Monday night at 8 o'clock, at the stand on Third street, and on the Friday night of next week, at the same hour and place, Senator Matt. Ransom will address the Democratic votes of this city and section.

North Carolinians in Florida.
A friend has handed us a copy of the *Florida Bulletin*, published at Lave Oak, Fla., a point where several North Carolinians are now quartered. The *Bulletin* gives an account of the completion, on the 23d ult., of the L. O. & R. B. R. R., the last spike in which was driven on the 23d ult. Capt. H. M. Drane and Col. Henry S. Haines are both from this section, as is well known. We copy that portion of the account relative to the completion of the road which refers to our former fellow-townsmen:
On Friday, the 23d inst., at 4 P. M., the last spike was driven at Rowlands Bluff, which completes another link in the great and most important line of railroads that penetrates our prosperous and growing State. For Live Oak and Suwannee county this will prove the greatest boom of the age, attracting immigrants to new and happy homes, and developing our vast resources. But we have not sufficient time and space in this issue to make an extended notice of this new road or the country through which it passes.
First, and appropriately, would we hasten to give the meed of merit and praise to those who have managed and conducted this enterprise to its successful termination, with a degree of accuracy, rapidity and vigor that is surprising in the result, and gives undoubted evidence of high and superior business qualifications.
The general management and supervision has been in the hands of Capt. H. M. Drane, who as Agent for the Plant Investment Company, the contractors, and special assistant to general managers of the S. F. & W. R. R., has proven himself *au fait* in matters pertaining to construction of railroads. As an organizer, manager and worker, he has displayed an exactness and perfection attained by few.

The Last of the Three.
The body of a colored man, very much decomposed, evidencing thereby that it had been many days in the water, was found in Northwest river, near the city, yesterday morning, by a colored man. The county authorities here were notified and the body was given interment. The remains were not identified, but it is supposed that it was the last of the three cotton thieves who were drowned about a month ago, a full report of the facts in regard to which were published by us at the time. The others, it will be remembered, were recovered some weeks ago. The remains recovered yesterday are thought to be those of the man who was called "Jim" by one of his drowning companions, but as to whose actual identity nothing more is known.

STATE NEWS.
Robesonian: We are deeply pained to announce the death of Mr. J. W. Floyd, a talented and promising young lawyer, which occurred at the residence of Mr. J. B. Pitman, in this town, last Monday afternoon, of typho-malarial fever, after a lingering illness of several weeks. He had been a resident of this town about two years, and for about eight months city editor of this paper.
Durham Plant: W. J. Evans handed us a ball of cotton a few days since that contained thirteen locks of fine cotton. We have the authority of Donald W. Bain, Esq., the chief clerk of the Treasury Department, for our country, is regarded as the Treasury as one of the best and most business-like Sheriffs in the State. He was one of the first to settle his taxes with the State, and settled every cent due.
Farmer and Mechanic: With much regret we learn that Mr. Wm. H. Hood, of Eagle Rock, suffered the amputation of his hand last week in consequence of catching it in the saw of a cotton gin, while "feeding." — From Dr. W. A. B. Richardson, of Eagle Rock, Wake county, we learn that not only are cotton-pickers wanted in that region (25 or 30, at the least), but also house carpenters, masons, etc. Mechanics and laborers are in demand in nearly all parts of the State.
Asheville Citizen: Mr. Parker, of this place, is getting out a patent for a new coffee pot which simplifies the process of clearing amazingly. We have seen it, without having tested it. But the principle is so simple, and yet so sound, that we are sure it will be a success. — The Glen Ingliss corn alluded to in our last issue did not have all its merits pointed out. Mr. W. L. Penland, who has charge of Mr. Kimmell's farm now known as Glen Ingliss, says that he not only improved the corn, but succeeded in increasing the rows in the ear from eight to ten. The average length is from 12 to 16 inches. It is certainly a very superior stock corn, and matures easily.
Charlotte Journal: A horse ran away with Mr. Gus Alexander, Sunday, about 4 miles south of the city, and in passing under the limb of a tree he was knocked from the saddle and remained unconscious for half an hour. His injuries are not serious, however. — As Mr. John P. Hunter, resident four miles from town on the Statesville road, was returning home from the city Saturday night, a burly negro sprang from the woods, and getting in front of the mules which Mr. Hunter drove, attempted to stop them, at the same time ordering Mr. Hunter to halt, which he didn't do, but produced a small parlor rifle, which frightened the would-be highwayman away. Mr. Hunter could, however, see him in the moonlight following the wagon at a distance for a mile or so. — An old gentleman named Patrick Donnell, of Raleigh, was found in a deplorable condition on College street Saturday night. He was

taken in charge by the police, and on Sunday morning he inquired for his money. He was told that he had none upon his person when found, whereupon he exhibited frantic evidences of distress, and said he had had one hundred and seventy-five dollars. He could give no account of how he had lost it nor how he came into the condition in which he was found. From the fact that his face was badly scratched, and other circumstances, the police are convinced that the old man was probably drugged and robbed.
