There were a few New River oysters in a cart in market yesterday, held at \$1.20 per gallon. Seaboardmen tell us that the recent rains have caused a rise of about 20 feet in the Cape Fear river, but that it is now slowly subsiding again.

We are sorry to hear that Mr. W. W. McDermid, of Lumberton, the Editor of the *Robesonian*, is very sick and that his friends are becoming alarmed as to his condition.

The possum market was quoted yesterday very active, with good demand for all grades, on a basis of 25 cents for middling possum. District uplands freely supplied. One colored gentleman was trying to bull the market.

Those bright skies and cheering suns which we prophesied yesterday have succeeded to wait until another day. At any rate they were not perceptible to the naked eye yesterday. On the contrary, it was a real winter's day, evidently the prelude to a frost.

There was a slight promise on Monday night of better weather, the moon having shown clear and beautiful, but it was not fulfilled yesterday when the wind blew from the northwest in a manner which forcibly reminded one of the overcast left at home.

We are glad to learn that Rev. Mr. Mendhall, the revivalist who is assisting Rev. Mr. Ricard in the great revival now in progress in Fifth Street M. E. Church, and who has been quite ill for the past few days, was yesterday reported as better.

We understand that the suit of Fowle & Vick vs. Kerchner & Boatwright, which has been pending on appeal in the Supreme Court, was yesterday decided in that court in favor of the defendants. This suit was relative to the old Journal Publishing Company.

**Futures in Spirits.** There were considerable operations in futures here yesterday, a somewhat unusual feature in this article. The confidence felt in its maintaining the present price, 50 cents per gallon, was shown in the fact that considerable transactions (much more than reported) were made at these figures for the four ensuing months, and one buyer offered to take 1,000 casks per month at 50 cents, but the offer was declined.
