He will speak at the stand, on Third street, at 8 o'clock, and will be escorted there by the procession.

The mounted escort will form at Southland's stables, Second street, at 7:30 o'clock, under charge of Capt. O. A. Wiggins.

I Saw, He Saw, You Saw.

Wilmington is becoming nearly as notable for its lumber and the saw mills by which it is manufactured as it has in years past been notable as a naval store market and for its extensive turpentine distilleries. The timber and lumber interest has been of much more importance to our people in the past than is generally known or has been generally supposed by the outside world. Our mills are of the best, and are conducted by gentlemen of experience, energy and capital, and their products find a ready market along our own coast as well as in the West Indies and some of the ports of South America.

As an evidence that the industry is profitable to those engaged in it, we notice that Messrs. Northrop & Cumming, who are gentlemen of long experience in the business, have recently entirely rebuilt their mill, in the southern section of the city, from the foundation to the roof, and have added 40 feet to its length. The mill is now furnished with new machinery throughout, and with Lane's new patent mill of the largest size, with two saws—top and bottom. The mill has also been supplied with new boilers, cut-off saws and trimming saws, all of which are of the best quality and the most approved kind. The saws make 750 revolutions per minute, with a 3 inch feed, making 2,250 running inches in that time. The mill has a capacity of 40,000 feet of lumber per day.

Connected with the establishment is also a planing mill, which has recently been entirely overhauled and put in the best possible condition. The capacity of the planing mill is 20,000 feet per day. They have also built a new double chimney, 57 feet high, on a solid rock foundation, with new flues, etc. By a mechanical arrangement, which we will not attempt to describe, the sawdust, as it is thrown from the saw, is

deposited near the mouth of the furnace, where it is utilized for fuel with which to "keep the thing working." There are also slides upon which to haul the timber from the dock into the mill, and railways for conveying the lumber from the mill to the vessels, and many other labor-saving conveniences, too numerous to mention, all in the best possible condition to expedite the work and lighten the expense. Taken all in all, it is one of the best equipped mills in the State.
