STATE NEWS.

Robesonian: We learn that the grist mill and cotton gin of Mr. Alex McLeod, of Thomason's township, were totally destroyed by fire on the night of the 26th ult. They were both water mills and were located about 200 yards apart. They were but recently fitted up at considerable expense. Mr. McLeod was the principal loser, having lost about 2,000 pounds of seed cotton and 40 bushels of toll corn. No insurance and no clue to the incendiary.

Charlotte Observer: The cotton compress has not had a moment's rest since daylight Monday morning. The bullion assays at the mint in this city during the month of October amounted to \$8,378.89.—Steam was yesterday turned on the engine at the new flouring mill of Vandiver and Chambers, on the corner of 6th and Church streets.—Mr. M. D. L. Biggers, who was nominated by the Liberals for county surveyor, but who resigned, gives as his reason for declining that he "recently joined the church at Matthews, and religion and Liberalism will not work together."

Newbern Journal: William Carter, a white tenant of Bryan Smith, coroner of Duplin county, who was assassinated last Wednesday, has been arrested and lodged in jail under strong suspicions of having committed the bloody deed. It is said Carter had made frequent threats of killing Smith under provocations growing out of crim con troubles.—Wm. C. Collins, convicted at the recent term of our Superior court of murder and sentenced to be hung on the 8th of December next, says he is satisfied with the trial and sentence of the court, that he killed the child as proven, but not intentionally.

News and Observer: Business yesterday was quite active, and the receipts were heavy, being 609 bales. There was no advance in prices, but, instead, they went down to the lowest figures in a long time. At the close of business the tone of the market was weak.—Yesterday afternoon Mr. George A. Diehtl, so long and so pleasantly known as the efficient keeper of the National Cemetery near this city, suffered a great loss in the death of his youngest child, Jimmie, by drowning, perhaps the saddest of all deaths.—As Mr. Diehtl sat in his office, writing, he heard a scream from the nurse, who cried out that the child was drowned. Going out he was horrified to see that the baby had fallen head foremost in a larg tub of water, which stands under the mouth of the pump of the cistern. The tub was nearly full, and it was ascertained that Jimmie, playing with a rubber ball in the water, had fallen in unnoticed. Mrs. Diehtl was sick in the house, the nurse had left the child, perhaps but a few minutes, unnoticed, but in that brief time its little life went out, for all attempts at resuscitation, and many were made, were fruitless.

At Fowler's Point.

There was a fine turnout yesterday at Fowler's Point and some excellent speaking, to say nothing of the oysters and the big beef bones. Mr. Jno. D. Stanford, of Duplin, led off in an excellent speech and he was followed by Col. E. D. Hall, Col. B. R. Moore and Mr. W. B. McKoy. After the speaking the oysters were in order and the crowd adjourned to the water side. There was a plenty for everybody and to spare. The occasion was brought to a close with three rousing cheers for the party. Our informant tells us that it was one of the most enthusiastic political gatherings he has ever attended.

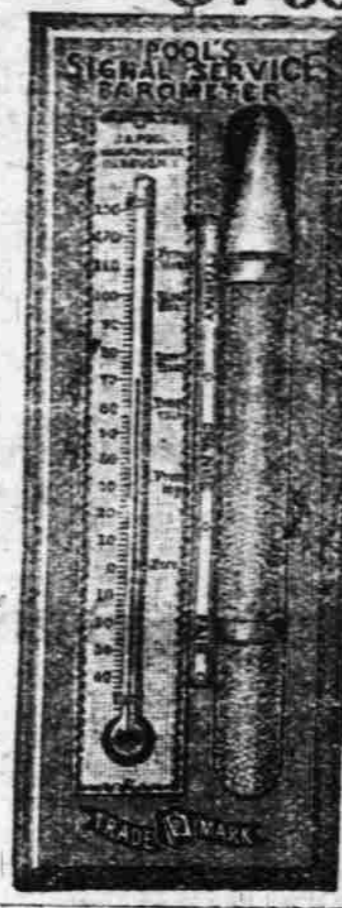
