Steam Transportation.

The steamship *America*, of Philadelphia, 761 tons burthen, which has been chartered by Mr. A. Y. Wilson, of this city, for transporting his lumber to northern markets, will arrive on Wednesday. The *America* will be used exclusively by her charterers and will use all possible haste in getting her cargoes to market. Returning, she will come empty, unless freights are ready for her to take in as soon as she is discharged. The great object in view will be quick trips and her charterers do not care enough for return freights from northern parts to delay the steamer a day to receive them. The *America* is said to be a very fine steamship and in No. 1 order. She will take her first cargo of lumber to New York.
