The receipts of cotton at this port yesterday took up 1,417 bales.

The returns for North Carolina come in so slowly that it is aggravating. Three-fourths of the State were unheard from at dark yesterday afternoon.

We regret to learn that Mr. Fred Metts, of this city, is dangerously ill at Newbern. Capt. J. I. Metts, his brother, has been telegraphed for and will leave this morning. We trust Mr. Metts' condition is not as critical as is feared.

NORTH CAROLINA.

Special Telegrams to DAILY REVIEW.
For the want of space and time (two of our printers are sick) we condense as follows from specials received at this office last night:

Rowan county falls off to 800 Democratic majority because of the light vote, Alexander is reported 400 Democratic majority. Cox is elected in the Raleigh district by about 500. Martin 200, Randolph 400, Wilson 350, Johnston 375, Chatham 400, McDowell 150, Pamlico 180, Beaufort 320, Durham 237, Orange 200, Pitt 35, Cumberland 10, Guilford 600, Iredell 550, Duplin 575, Carteret 28 and Columbus 550, Democratic majorities. We gain 100 in Chowan; 200 in Warren, 150 in Pender, and 135 in Brunswick. There are also large gains in Edgecombe where the colored vote has fallen off about 1,000. Robeson has gone Republican by 150 and we lose two representatives there, although McLean and Toon for the Senate are safe. Canaday has 350 in Bladen, 75 in Brunswick and 100 in Pender. Sampson, Onslow, Moore and Harnett are unheard from as yet.

Floral Tribute to Gen. Moise.
During the grand rally in the Fifth Ward, on Monday night, Gen. E. W. Moise was the recipient of a floral wreath from the ladies of the ward. Miss Mamie Orr, a little lady about ten years of age, presented the tribute to the distinguished speaker, in behalf of the fair donors, in a neat little speech. Her modest demeanor and childish simplicity won the applause of the large concourse. Gen. Moise, in receiving the token of appreciation and regard, made readily a very fine little response, notwithstanding the fact that he was taken by surprise and was compelled to surrender before the battery of bright eyes which was leveled upon him. When the distinguished orator from our sister State was about closing his speech he was the recipient of a beautiful bouquet from the hands of Mr. Edward Griffith in behalf of the "sterner stuff and honest yeomanry" of the ward.

The Result.
It is impossible as yet to give a thoroughly correct estimate of the result in this State. The returns are very slow in coming in, but from what we have received and from what we know of majorities in previous elections, we feel justified in saying that the State has gone Democratic by perhaps 10,000 majority; that Green is elected by not less than 1,000 majority, and that we have secured eight of the nine Congressmen. The Legislature, we are satisfied, is Democratic, but by a reduced majority on joint ballot.
