The New York Times nominates S. J. Randall for Speaker of the next House on a platform of, 1st, a radical reduction in the expenses of the government; 2d, the return of every superfluous officeholder to private usefulness; 3d, the abolition of the internal revenue system; 4th, a cordial reform and simplification of the tariff; 5th, no subsidies, no jobbery, no stealing, no masters.

It is not a matter of rejoicing to us that Beas Butler has been elected Governor of the State of Massachusetts. On the contrary we would really be sorry for the people of the old Commonwealth did we think that they either cared for or deserved pity from any one.

Equal rights, equal powers, equal burdens, equal privileges, and equal protection by law under the Government for every citizen of the republic, without limitation of race or sex or property qualification, whether it be by a tax on property or a poll tax on persons.

The New York Sun, commenting on Butler's election and the woman clause as quoted above, says: This is a plank of the platform by means of which Major-General Benjamin F. Butler has ascended to the highest place in the glorious old Commonwealth and alone of all men in the United States has become entitled to be addressed as "Your Excellency."

It is quite evident from this that too much election has made Dana mad. Robert G. Ingersoll's head seems to be level on the great question of the day, the causes of the Republican defeat and disaster, if he is unsound on theological points. Here is his response to an inquiry on the subject, written out by himself: "First, the extravagant appropriations. Secondly, the refusal to reduce taxation. At least \$75,000,000 should have been taken from the burdens borne by the people."

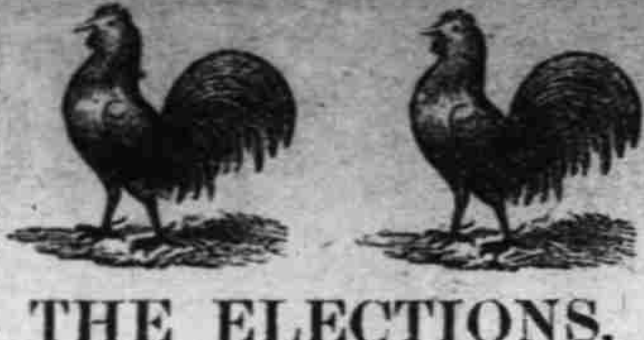

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—Noon.—Jacksonville, Fla., specials says that most of the democrats concede Bisbee's (rep.) election by a small majority, but a few claim that the returns from Dade and Brevard counties will elect Finlay. Both sides are anxious. If Bisbee is elected the democrats will contest on the ground of illegal republican colonization and voting reported from three counties. The 2nd district of Florida will probably have another contested election case.
