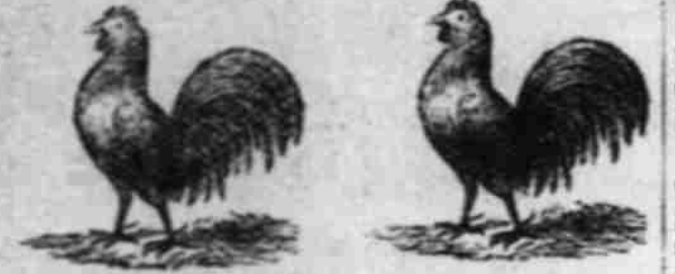

THE ELECTIONS.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 10—Night.—The official canvass of the vote in this county was concluded at 6 o'clock this morning. The majority for Peelle, rep., for Congress, from this county, is 940. His majority in the district is 87. Additional returns from the Congressional districts confirm previous reports, leaving the delegation with nine democrats and four republicans. The democratic majority on the State ticket will be from 10,000 to 12,000.

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 10—Night.—The Evening Journal estimates Cleveland's majority at 194,600; Hill, Lieut. Governor, majority at about 119,000; Gen. Slocum majority at 167,000, and claims that the Erie Canal amendment is adopted by over 300,000 votes and the Judiciary amendment by at least 55,000 votes.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10—Night.—A Nashville, Tenn., special to the Evening Post says: Bates, democrat, majority over Hawkins, republican, for Governor so far as about 26,000, and over all about 16,000. The Legislature is largely democratic in both Houses.

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 10—Night.—The election of John S. Wise, coalitionist candidate for Congressman at Large, is now a foregone conclusion, and it only requires the official figures to fix his actual majority.

JAMES CONWAY, who was in jail at Ballston, N. Y., charged with the murder of Peter McLean, committed suicide yesterday morning by cutting a large vein in the calf of his leg.

TENNESSEE.

The Penalty for Murder.
[By Telegraph to Daily Review.]

KNOXVILLE, Nov. 10—Night.—Samuel and Milton Hodge, colored, brothers, were hanged here to-day in the presence of about 8,000 persons. Both were swung off from a wagon at 1:30 p. m., and at the end of 10 minutes both were dead. Religious services were held at the place of execution. The doomed men spoke for about 10 minutes each, saying that they were prepared to die and were "going home to be with their father." As the black cap was pulled over Milton's face, he sang in a strong voice "Going home on de even train," and Samuel sang "Going home to die no more." The weather was beautiful and good order was preserved. The crime for which the Hodge brothers were hanged was the killing of their brother-in-law, one year ago. They seized him, and tied his hands and Milton shot him. They killed McFarlane because he had ill-treated his wife and his sister.

WASHINGTON.

Another Call for Bonds—The Cotton Crop.
[By Telegraph to Daily Review.]

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10—Night.—Secretary Folger to-day issued a call for \$15,000,000 five per cent. bonds, continued at 3 1/2 per cent. The principal and interest will be paid at the Treasury on and after the 10th of February next and interest will cease on that day.

The Department of Agriculture reports exceptional fine weather during the past month, for maturing and harvesting cotton, and returns the estimated yield of the acreage of each State, as follows: Virginia, pounds of lint to the acre, 178; North Carolina, 180; South Carolina, 183; Georgia, 152; Florida, 117; Alabama, 150; Mississippi, 190; Louisiana, 233; Texas, 240; Arkansas, 283; Tennessee, 170. These figures are the result of the consolidations of the revised county estimates and supposed continuance of average weather for the six weeks of the harvest season yet remaining. The injury by the caterpillar and boll worm is not appreciable, except in a few counties. In four-fifths of the localities reporting the presence of either, they have hastened the maturity without lessening materially the yield.

FOREIGN NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 10—Night.—The Daily Telegraph, this morning, in an editorial on the American election, referring to civil service reform, says: We may take it for granted that disgust at the continued indifference of the party managers to the national disgrace tended greatly to alienate thousands of voters who stayed at home, or defying all the traditions of their political lives, voted the democratic ticket. It would be strange if it were reserved for the democrats to cleanse the Augean stables of American politics, and to secure for the people what every well ruled State must have—an upright and permanent civil and judicial service.

The Standard, in an editorial, this morning, says: If the Republicans in the United States lay seriously to heart the plain lesson of Tuesday's elections they will not, in the long run, have much reason to deplore the magnitude of the discomfiture, in which the misconduct of their leaders has involved them; that the result will certainly give an impetus to the future for honest men of all political opinions and the remedy for the evils which now deprave politics.

The Rich Working Against the Poor.

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 10—T. & C. Eastman, of N. Y., W. A. Monroe, of Albany, W. H. Vanderbilts, and H. W. Arnold, of Chicago, have formed a company with a reported capital of \$1,000,000, to oppose the Chicago dressed beef enterprise of Hammond & Co., and Swift & Co., of Chicago. They will open depots in every city where the other firms have agents now, and will sell beef, brought from Chicago in the American Refrigerator Co.'s cars, at a price which will just cover expenses. This is regarded as a move to crowd out the dressed beef trade in the interest of the live stock business of the East.

UTAH.

Polygamism a Requisite to Official Position.

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 10—Night.—It has come to light that at a meeting of the higher priesthood, after the late conference, President Taylor instructed them that the priests and bishops and their councillors are not entitled to hold their position unless they qualify by becoming polygamists. There are a few such officers who are monogamists. One has since resigned rather than take another wife, and his resignation was accepted. Others are in a quandary as to what to do about it. One very young and newly-made apostle, it is understood, has complied with the condition of holding his office. This is the logic of the position taken by the church. It must stand by its religion, law or no law.

Telegraphic Brevities.

The iron bridge of the Georgia Railroad Company over the Oconee river, at Athens, Ga., fell yesterday, killing one workman and seriously wounding six others.

The dead body of Stephen McKavit, a farmer of Putnam Co., Ga., was found in a gully near his plantation yesterday. It is supposed that he was murdered on Monday last by negroes. One colored man, Calvin Jordan, has been arrested.

STATE NEWS.

Laurinburg Enterprise: Political discussion provoked five severe fights between Democrats and Republicans in Fayetteville last Monday, and it was not a good day for fighting either.

Fayetteville Examiner: We regret to learn that our neighbor, W. W. McDiarmid, of the Robesonian, has been compelled to place himself under the medical skill of Dr. Graham of Charlotte. He has been suffering with his eyes some weeks, and fears are entertained of his losing his eyesight.

Chatham Record: Mr. Henry T. Bright has shown us a pocket knife that he says is a hundred years old, and it still does good service. —Mr. Geo. W. Thompson has raised a second crop of green peas. They are "volunteers" that dropped from the vines. —We regret to learn that, on the 3rd inst., the dwelling Mrs. William Hackney, of Oakland township, was destroyed by fire. The roof caught from sparks from the chimney.

Wadesboro Times: Another curiosity this week is from Mr. D. D. Teal. It is an ear of corn, joined to which and surrounding it are four other distinct ears. All five ears grew in one shock.

We have an instance of good farming reported to us on Saturday. Mr. M. W. Mowery, in this county raised this year on a one horse farm 16 bales of cotton, already ginned, and 200 bushels of corn. This is an example worthy of emulation.

Newbern Nut Shell: About 7 o'clock last night, the roof of W. F. Rounree's store, on Middle street, was discovered on fire and the alarm was at once given. In an incredible short time, the fire had communicated to adjoining buildings, and roofs of the ice house and Mr. H. W. Wahab's wholesale establishment were also on fire before our fireman could get to work, though they did most excellent and praiseworthy work and had streams from both of the steam fire engine companies in a less time than 15 minutes after the bell commenced ringing. The three buildings alluded to, together with the building occupied by Dr. H. G. Bates, and Messrs. Roberts Bros. store, were burned to the ground, while Mr. J. Hughes, office was so badly burned that it will probably cost as much to fit it up as it was, as it would to replace it by a new building. The fire also communicated to the upper story of the Gaston House, badly damaging two or three of the rooms fronting the burning building, and the heat and sparks caught the roofs of Mr. H. Springer's dry goods store and Alex. Holton's liquor store, on the opposite side of Middle street. Loss about \$25,000.
