Disaster at Sea.

The Nor. barque *Immanuel*, which arrived at this port yesterday morning brought in the captain and crew of the schr. *Mattie B. Eulon*, which vessel the captain abandoned on Tuesday, the 8th, water-logged, dismantled and with loss of rudder, in longitude 78.40, latitude 31.25 Capt. Sharp, of the wrecked vessel, reported to Messrs Geo. Harriss & Co.

The Carolina Central.

The preliminary hearing in the suit of Mrs. Virginia B. Matthews vs. D. R. Murchison, relative to the Carolina Central R. R., is to take place this week in Chambers, in the U. S. District Court Room, before Judges Bond and Seymour. If the Judges arrive in time the hearing will be opened to-morrow.

There will be a brilliant array of counsel in this suit. The plaintiff will be represented by Messrs. McRae & Strange and Russell & Ricaud, of this city, Col. H. C. Jones, of Charlotte and Judge Dillon (author of Dillon on Corporations) of New York, while Messrs. Stedman & Latimer, Hon. Geo. Davis, and Maj. D. J. Devane, of this city, Messrs. Merrimon & Fuller, of Raleigh and Messrs. Robinson (brother to Col. Jno. M. Robinson) and Patterson, of New York, will appear for the defendants.

Cotton.

The receipts of cotton at this port for the eleven days ending with yesterday foot up 10,967 bales, as against 8,365 bales for the corresponding period last year, an increase this week of 1,792 bales. The total receipts for the crop year to date foot up 48,179 bales, as against 47,167 bales to same date in 1881, a decrease this year of 988 bales.

Death of Dr. Kenneth King.

We regret to learn of the death of Dr. Kenneth K. King, formerly of this city and a nephew of Dr. E. D. King and the late Dr. J. Francis King. He died at Rutherford, N. J., near New York, on Thursday last. Dr. King studied medicine in this city but after obtaining his diploma removed to New York, where he married a grand niece of the venerable Peter Cooper. Soon after he married he removed to Rutherford, where he established a drug business and continued also the practice of his profession. He had been ill for some weeks previous to his death.
