ABOUT THE SIZE OF IT.

The following letter from the editor of the Arkansas Republican to the N. Y. Mail and Express, gives the facts as to Southern politics with remarkable force and clearness:

DEAR SIR—Your note of the 27th inst., asking for "brief expressions as to the campaign of both parties and estimates of the strength of the respective State tickets, the Congressional candidates, etc.," has been received several days, and I have been "wondering" what exactly you want—rather, how exactly to get at what I think you do want; and now, at this late date, I can only say, as Igersoll says of a hell and a hereafter—"I don't know." Still I can give you the information—if you do not already know it—that this State is Democratic in all its departments and ramifications, and in all its tickets and its candidates, both State and Congressional; not that we do not occasionally have in the field a so-called Republican candidate and even a Republican ticket; but it is "no go" at the polls—the Democrats carry the day, if not in one way, then in another. And this will remain so indefinitely—"world without end;" and perhaps it is as well the way the Republican party of this State and of the South generally has been managed, and the way Republican officials in the South generally act when in power, as though they never expected to rot another taste, and wanted to "gobble up" all within sight or reach while the present chance lasted.

FOREIGN NEWS. [By Cable to Daily Review.] LONDON, Nov. 15—Noon.—A dispatch from New Haven states that the 3rd officer and quarter-master and three seamen constituting the crew of the boat sent from the steamer Westphalia, in search of the steamer which collided with the Westphalia have been landed there by a Belgian pilot boat. They report having seen the other steamer sink with all hands.
