**The Annual Hunt.**  
Powder, shot and guns are in demand now for the regular annual Thanksgiving hunt. The woods around the city, as usual, will be full of animals of all sizes, ages and colors, and the feathered tribe, from the tiny sparrow to the ungainly buzzard, will be the objects of the marksmen's aim. We hope we will not be called upon to chronicle any accident from the careless use of fire-arms, or from any other cause. So be careful and mind how you handle your guns, remembering that they are "dangerous without lock, stock or barrel."

**"Take to the Right."**  
Will pedestrians in this city never learn to navigate the streets without jostling and running against each other? Right down in the heart of the city on any crowded thoroughfare, notably on the south side of Market, between Second and Third streets, not only at night but in the broad, open daylight on Saturday evenings it is almost impossible for one to get along. And why? Because the crowd does not seem to understand the simple rule of "taking to the right." If pedestrians would only follow this rule, there would be much less confusion and annoyance. It is really amusing, sometimes to look on to see two persons butting and dodging each other in their endeavors to get out of each other's way in the general conglomeration of human beings frequently seen in the street named. In fact, it has become to be a nuisance, and ladies wishing to visit stores in that vicinity on Saturday evenings avoid doing so as much as possible.

Not only is the method of traveling "to the right" applicable to the crowded thoroughfares but should be practised by every one, especially at night in the darker streets of the city, and there would seldom be "a run into" as is now frequently the case.

Another reprehensible practise that we have noticed among a certain class, is to string themselves three or four abreast across the sidewalks and march along in utter defiance of the rights of others and frequently forcing ladies into the gutter or uncomfortably crowding them against the wall. The rules of common politeness should teach such persons better, but it seems that it does not and unprotected ladies have to submit to the outrage and pass on.

In large cities where the streets are immensely more crowded than here the throngs of people pass and repass with infinitely more ease and comfort than here in our little city. We hope to see a decided reform among us ere long in the mode of traveling the public streets.
