## LOCAL NEWS.

There is a net loss this month of nine  
minutes of daylight.

The regular monthly meeting of the  
Board of Aldermen will be held next  
Monday evening.  
No decision has yet been announced  
in the railroad case on the petition to  
appoint a receiver.

The new county officers go into office  
on Monday next; i. e. all who can qualify  
by giving the necessary bonds.  
A large alligator was killed on Thurs

The cotton market was weak and  
sick yesterday but stiffened and rallied  
about the close of the day, the market  
closing strong at 9 cents per pound on  
a basis of middling.
