Hearing the report of the pistol the colored woman ran in the house and found the suicide upon the floor in a dying condition, entirely unconscious and the blood streaming from a wound in her head. Assistance was at once summoned, but before any could reach the house she was dead Officer Howland, of the Police force, was soon present and at once took control of the house. Coroner Jacobs, having been notified of the fact, summoned a jury, who repaired to the house and having taken testimeny and viewed the body, returned a verdict that "the deceased came to her death by a pistol shot wound inflicted by her own hand."

The deceased was, we believe, a na tive of Virginia, but has been in this city for several years. Two of her sisters have lived here, but both are dead. Geneva, one of the sisters, died a few in each case, which was paid. months ago from the combined effects of an over-dose of laudanum, the use of which had become with her a confirmed habit, and dissipation. Since the death of Geneva the deceased had seemed to realize her loneliness, and when not under the influence of intoxication, was very much depressed. She was a woman of about 32 years of age, and before sin and debauchery had done its errible work must have been remarkably good-looking.
