There are thirty-five thousand more foreign born voters in Minnesota than natives, yet all the members of Congress, save one, are native born.

It is very generally believed by those who have examined the subject that the present year's cotton crop will reach 7,000,000 bales. If it had been 1,000,000 less it would have been much better for the producers.

It is intimated that important relations may be expected should Senator Beck's resolution looking to an inquiry into the assessment business be passed. There is a Washington story to the effect that Jay Hubbell has already notified the custodian of the assessment records to destroy them.

The cellars under the apartment houses on Seventh avenue, between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, New York, have been blasted out of solid rock, entailing a cost of nearly half a million dollars before the structures reached the grade on the avenue. There are to be eight of them, and the total cost will be \$400,000 each. They are to be named after European cities—Madrid, Lisbon, Cordova and Barcelona being selected for four of them.

The Children's Aid Society in New York have a kindergarten school, in which ninety little pupils are taught various operations of agriculture and the nature and uses of the produce of a farm. A trough containing earth is made to represent a corn field, and this is ploughed, harrowed and planted. The children are taught how the corn grows, and the supposed ripened corn is taken to a mill and the meal is made into johnny cakes, baked and eaten.

The President has nominated Brigadier-General John Pope to be Major-General in place of Major-General McDowell, placed on the retired list, but we hope that he may never be confirmed. His career as a would-be military leader has shown that he is not fit for the position, and his brutal conduct towards General Fitz John Porter makes him entirely unworthy for such an exalted position. Bully for Bull Run!

The question of the succession to the primacy of England is naturally much discussed there, and the most probable speculation, as stated by L. J. Jennings in a special to the New York World, is that Mr. Gladstone will promote the Rev. Dr. Edward Harold Browne, Bishop of Winchester, who was at school with him at Eton, and then translate Bishop McKarness, of Oxford, to Winchester and put Archdeacon Palmer over the See of Oxford.

President Arthur has a very felicitous method of avoiding personalities whenever he sees fit to do so. In his recent message to Congress he manifests this aptitude by speaking of the Hayes Administration as "the four years preceding President Garfield's inauguration." There is a quiet contempt in the expression that could hardly have found utterance in any other way. It was an expression also which gave President Arthur's views regarding that time—as not worthy of being denominated an administration—and at the same time gratify his personal feelings towards Mr. Hayes and John Sherman, both of whom he has ample cause to detest.

Senator Vance is in earnest in regard to the outrages of the internal revenue system, having recently introduced a resolution calling upon the Secretary of the Treasury to furnish, as soon as possible, a detailed statement showing the cost of collecting the internal revenue in each collection district, the number of employes in each district and the percentage of cost upon the sums collected in each. The resolution has been agreed to, but whether the desired information will ever be forthcoming is yet to be determined. Our able Senator, however, is in earnest and will be persistent in his efforts, and he will either get at the facts or place the administration in an awkward predicament. He will accomplish something—either fact or fun—in the matter, and we expect it will be a good deal of both.

OUR NAVY. From the recent report of the Secretary of the Navy we ascertain that the United States have thirty-one naval vessels now in commission. Of this number it is well known that only a very few—not one-fourth—are fit for any sort of effective service of a warlike character, and in case of hostilities with any of the nations of the old world, would be wiped from the ocean by barely a breath.

of the annual addition of fifty cadet midshipmen and twenty-five cadet engineers to this force of officials. (It will be borne in mind that the officers of the Marine Corps are not included as belonging to the navy in making up the aggregate.) There are, to man these thirty-one vessels, seven thousand and seventy-four seamen, nine hundred and fifty apprentices, five hundred non-commissioned officers and musicians, and fifteen hundred privates of the Marine Corps, making an aggregate of ten thousand and twenty-four enlisted men in the naval service of the country. This gives nearly five men to each officer, which is a disproportion altogether unnecessary and inexcusable and one which calls loudly for reformation. and that speedily.
