LABOUCHERE AND LANGTRY.

Mrs. Labouchere Explaining the Cause of the Trouble Between Them.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 10.—Mrs. Labouchere is in town. She says that her husband told her to go to Washington and Philadelphia before returning home.

"Yes, I must confess that it is in a measure true," was the reply "Mrs. Langtry, when she first went to London, enjoyed a social triumph and was received everywhere, her grace and beauty giving her a passport into the most refined and exclusive circles.

Mrs. Labouchere spoke more in sorrow than in anger, and as her mind reverted to the shadows that gathered around her fair protegee, she said with a sigh: "Yes, I was very fond of her."

When asked if she would venture an explanation of the causes which had led to the breach between them she looked thoughtfully at a beautiful set of diamonds and sapphires on her finger, and replied:

"The unhappy subject has already been talked about, and perhaps it would be as well to explain its causes. During Mrs. Langtry's engagement in New York she has been the recipient of many polite courtesies from gentlemen, and only during the latter part of her stay in that city had these attentions assumed such a character as to induce me to express my disapprobation.

Just before the close of the New York engagement, perhaps two days, I heard that Frederick Gebhart, a young man whose marked attention to Mrs. Langtry had been the cause of much gossip, intended sending his horses and carriages to Boston for her use, and to continue his attentions there as he had done in New York.

FOREIGN NOTES.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—An additional number of marines will be sent to Ireland.

DUBLIN, Dec. 10.—It is understood that there was only one dissenting juror in the case of Patrick Higgins, the alleged principal in the Huddy murders, who is to be placed on trial again to-morrow.

The Government has given £1,350 reward to the three Joyces, who were witnesses for the prosecution in the trial of the Maamtrasna murderers.

A moonlighter named Bird was tried in Belfast on Friday, but the jury failed to agree upon a verdict. Bird was put on trial again, yesterday, and the jury again disagreed.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—Mr. T. D. Sullivan, member of Parliament for Westmeath, in a speech at Trim, county Meath, last evening, said he was there to show the Government that neither the Irish people nor their leaders were dismayed by the prosecutions.

He advised the people to pay all their creditors before paying their rent. He urged organization, and endorsed all that Mr. Davitt said in his speech at Nevan for which he is being prosecuted.

British Cabinet Changes.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—The Daily News understands that Earl Derby will immediately enter the Cabinet. No other change than is necessitated thereby will occur at present; at any rate not before the meeting of Parliament, though there will probably be further changes.

Mr. Fawcett's Condition Improved.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—Late yesterday Postmaster-General Fawcett had considerable hemorrhage from the air passages, and a consultation of the physicians was held. The bleeding has subsided. The loss of blood left Mr. Fawcett feeble, but there has been no recurrence of the hemorrhage, and his condition to-night is improved.

STATE NEWS.

Ashville News: The French Broad railroad, now known as the Carolinas, Cumberland Gap and Chicago railroad is a fixed fact, and work has been begun on it. We learn that the route for the bridge over the creek crossed in coming to town strong enough to bear up wagons and teams Friday morning. Ice on the ponds is 3 or 4 inches thick, and the harvest has begun.

Goldsboro Messenger: The gin and gin house of Mr. J. W. Talton, in Stony Creek township, was destroyed by fire last Thursday, together with about six bales of cotton and some 2,000 bushels of seed. No insurance. A 16 year old daughter of Mr. W. H. Overman, and esteemed citizen of Brodgen township, is laying in a very precarious condition. About two weeks ago, during an attack of epilepsy, she fell into the fire and her body was shockingly burned before assistance could be rendered. Dr. Spicer is attending her, and the amputation of both arms is deemed necessary, but her prostration is so intense that it cannot be undertaken. There is little or no hope of recovery.
