"Blue Laws, or the Horrors of the Penal Code" is the title of a warring farce produced in New York by Tony Pastor. It is a travesty on the new Sunday laws and their enforcement.

The Commercial Travelers of the country are in session in Baltimore, and one of the most important matters before them is the attempt to secure national legislation to so regulate commerce between the States as to do away with the required local licenses.

Those who have investigated the matter and who are the most competent to judge, estimate this year's crops of Texas at 1,400,000 bales of cotton and 150,000,000 bushels of corn. This places that State first on the list of Southern States in the production of cotton and corn.

According to a correspondent writing from Cairo, the Egyptians are in the very darkness of ignorance. He writes that "among the entire Egyptian nation there are not more than two hundred individuals possessing what in America would be called a common school education."

A repeal of the tobacco-tax, a two-cents postage bill, an anti-political assessment bill and a new bankruptcy bill are all well under way, although the latter has been assigned to oblivion for this session in the pigeon-holes of the Senate Judiciary.

Keely has filed a caveat by which he will be allowed to retain the secret of his motor tor at least a year longer—"him and another fellow." One Boeckel has been appointed receiver of the wonderful secret, and it is believed that Boeckel's report to the court will encourage the belief that Keely will eventually be able to do all that he has promised.

The Durham Plant says that a prominent physician of that town heard Mr. John T. Williams, of Warrenton, now dead, who was for a long time a naval officer, say that he saw Morgan, whom it is said the masons killed, and talked with him as many as fifty times in Constantinople, where he lived and dressed as a Turk.

The pension laws, as they now exist, bid fair to scoop up a big share of the public money—a much larger amount than most people are aware of. According to Commissioner Dudley's report there are \$300,000,000 yet to be paid out for arrears of pensions, and that the actual pension roll will amount to \$80,000,000 or \$90,000,000 before there will be any perceptible decrease in the draft upon the treasury for this purpose. He thinks that about 50 per cent. of all who enlisted during the war still survive, and there is no doubt that a large proportion of these are recipients of pensions, and there will be constant additions to the pension rolls of those who have not yet filed their claims.
