Railroad Velocipedes.

The Western Union Telegraph Com pany is supplying its linemen with what is termed the railroad velocipede, a novel little machine, self-propelling and adjustable for any gauge of railroad, with which the repairer can reach quickly any break or interruption to the wires (for it can make twenty miles an hour) thus doing away with a loss of time waiting for schedule trains, when breaks are near at hand.
