Rev. J. L. M. Curry, Agent of the Peabody Fund, was to have delivered an address on education, in Goldsboro, last night.

Prof Brush states that he has solved the problem of electrical storage, and that private residences can be illuminated independently of lighting stations.

The whiskey men are on hand in Washington and with plenty of money. They seem confident that they will be able to get through their bill to postpone the tax on the whiskey on hand for ten years.

The Rev. Dr. Hugh Miller Thompson is the fifth Bishop taken within twelve years from the pulpit of Trinity Protestant Episcopal Church, New Orleans, the others being Bishops Pierce of Arkansas, Beckwith of Georgia, Harriss of Michigan and Gallaher of Louisiana.

The Mutual Life Insurance Company are to erect a very imposing edifice on the site of the old postoffice building in New York. It is to be eleven stories high and at one point will reach 161 feet from the ground. It is to cost a million and a half.

The returns from Watauga have at last been received and we can now know just what the majorities are. Watauga gave Bennett 735 and Dockey 623 votes. The total vote is found to be: Bennett 111,763, Dockey 111,320. Bennett's majority 443. The result of the canvass of the vote has been certified to by Governor Jarvis by the members of the board of canvassers present who all signed it.

Reports received at Boston of the total gross exchanges at the twenty-six leading clearing-houses in the United States for the week ending Saturday night show a great improvement in business throughout the country, both as compared with that of last week and with that of the corresponding week of last year. The aggregate clearings for the week were \$1,316,849,496, against \$1,303,590,255 for the previous week.

Mr. Edison said to a reporter in Boston on Wednesday: "The largest undertaking we have on hand now is to carry 15,000 horse-power of electricity eighteen miles into the City of Mexico; for the purpose of lighting that city and furnishing power for various purposes. We are only making estimates as yet. This thing of carrying power from waterfalls to a considerable distance is going to be done very extensively in the future. It is practicable to carry 25,000 horse-power twenty miles if necessary."

We most cheerfully concur in all that the Goldsboro Messenger has said relative to Mr. Dortch's abilities as well as his character and integrity and the Messenger will please note that we have never attempted to disparage any one of these—but we must insist upon it that Mr. Dortch's aspirations are too high and that he has no more chance of succeeding Gen. Ransom than has the Editor of the Messenger or of the REVIEW. Ransom will be nominated on the first ballot in saucy—mark the prediction—and the opposition will be so slight as to be scarcely any opposition at all. And, apropos of this fact, just read here a clipping from the Charleston News and Courier which shows the estimation in which Gen. Ransom is held beyond the borders of his own State:

The North Carolina Legislature, at its meeting next month, will elect a United States Senator, as the term of Senator M. W. Ransom will expire on March 4. Gen. Ransom is a candidate for re-election, and the hope is that he will be his own successor. It would be difficult for him to succeed a better man.

The judgment of outside observers, when the merit and value of public officers are to be measured, is not likely to be too favorable, as it is free from the bias which is naturally caused by personal preferences and local associations. It should then be extremely pleasant to the North Carolina Democracy to know that Gen. Ransom is held by the Democracy of the Southern States, in general, in as high regard and respect as the most devoted son of the Old North State could desire. North Carolina would do injustice to the State and to the country at large by taking Gen. Ransom from the Senate, at a time when his long and distinguished service has given him a national reputation, and prepared him for still greater usefulness in the future. It is no disparagement of any other candidate, if there be one, to say that Gen. Ransom is better fitted to represent North Carolina in the Senate than any one can be who is without his training and knowledge, or who is less favorably known.

Gen. Ransom stands in the front rank of Southern Democrats, and it would be a loss to the whole country if he were to leave the Senate at the period when such men as he will have an opportunity to make their influence effective for the good of the whole people. Generous, liberal, courteous and dignified, loyal to the South as it was and faithful to the Union as it is, Gen. Ransom richly deserves the re-election to which he aspires.

The House of Representatives has decided to take a holiday recess from Friday, the 22nd, until January 2nd. On Thursday, with much of pomp and parade, they refused, by a decided vote, to take this recess, and adopted a resolution fining every member absent without leave \$50 a day. It took only twenty-four hours for them to weaken.
