They are trying to get up a Lincoln Presidential boom in Washington.

Twenty-five Sisters of Mercy went from New Orleans to Pensacola at the outbreak of yellow fever, nursed the sick until the disease disappeared, and returned unharmed.

Judge Tourgee remarks in his magazine that "the Republican party is as dead to-day as if Cheops had been builded over its ashes." Tourgee ought to know, as he helped to kill it.

Lt. Col. Geo. W. Schofield, of the Sixth Cavalry, shot himself dead at Fort Apache last Sunday morning. Deceased was 45 years old, and was a brother to Gen. Schofield, now commanding on the Pacific.

The News and Observer speaks of having felt the shock of an earthquake in that city last Monday evening.—We'll bet it resulted from the attempt of some indignant sovereign to smother his editor.

The Petersburg Index-Appeal speaks up warmly in favor of the abolition by Congress of the postage on newspapers. It very truly says that the theory of the law is that subscribers pay the postage, which is not true in practice. About 10,000 publishers pay the postage on the reading matter for 50,000,000 people. In almost every other case of taxation the consumer is made to pay the tax. In this case it is impracticable, and the remedy is in the abolition entirely of the postage.

The New York Herald sums up a difficult question in a few words when it says that any honest and earnest effort to restore our lost commerce on the ocean must, to be effectual, embody one or both of two propositions; first, a proposition to let in free the materials of vessels, when so finished as to be all ready to be put together, and, second, a proposition to repeal the navigation laws so that ships purchased abroad may be given American register. It is a disgraceful truth, as the Herald says, that in order to maintain a few ship-building yards on the Delaware, and at two or three other points, we have chased the national colors from the high seas, and inflicted more damage on our commerce than was inflicted by all the Confederate cruisers put together.

The work of the tariff commission does not stand a close inspection. Take cotton ties, for instance. The commission recommend that the tax on iron ties be increased from 35 per cent, ad valorem, which is the duty now paid, to 14-10 cents per pound. At the first glance it was supposed that there was to be only an inconsiderable change; but examination shows that what is proposed is more than double the duty now imposed. This can be illustrated by actual experience in Charleston, as narrated by the News and Courier. A large dealer in cotton ties received a short time ago 9,500 bundles of foreign cotton ties upon which he paid a duty of \$3,000, being exactly 35 per cent on their value in Europe, or at the rate of 32 cents a bundle. The tariff commission now propose to make the duty 14-10 cents per pound. A bundle of ties weighs 55 pounds, so that the new tariff if adopted will be 77 cents a bundle against 32 cents, the present rate.

The Langtry is superbly lodged at Philadelphia, where she is playing now. We clip from the New York World: Her apartments at the Hotel Bellevue, on the first floor, comprise parlor, three bedrooms and two bath-rooms. The parlor is furnished in blue satin and filled with all the luxurious appointments which the art of the upholsterer could command. An East-lake cabinet, extending from the mantel to the ceiling, has been filled with costly bric-a-brac, and large bronzes have been placed for the occasion in the windows and corners of the room. Elaborate designs of natural flowers will be arranged on the centre-table that they may breathe a fragrant welcome to the arriving guest. The room known as the Bridal Chamber, which is furnished in elaborate style in yellow plush, will be the bed-chamber, while a little compartment attached will be transformed into a miniature dining-room. Three maids accompany Mrs. Langtry. At an adjacent stable a pair of horses will remain in harness from 8 a. m. until midnight during the entire week, awaiting her command.

The House Pension Committee have agreed upon a bill granting pensions to all survivors of the Mexican war. It excludes from its provisions ex-President Davis, who was one of the most gallant spirits of the war, which is about as dirty a piece of business as ever emanated from any Congressional committee. Mr. Davis is now and always has been incomparably the superior of any one of the malignant wretches who have sought to put ignominy upon him.
