The Charleston News and Courie published in a recent issue a comparison of charges on handling cotton in the cities of New York, Norfolk, Char-

leston and Savannah which is of interest. Wilmington is not mentioned and perhaps for excellent reasons. In his subordinates and \$250 each to six New York, according to the News and Courier, the expenses attending the sale
