**No Timber.**

It is presumed that the low water has kept raft back, and it is hoped that the recent rains, of which it would seem we have had an abundance, will cause sufficient rise in the Cape Fear and its tributaries to enable the raftsmen to bring down their timber.

**Oakdale Cemetery.**  
During the year 1882 there have been 82 interments in Oakdale. Of this number 2 were over 10 years and under 20; 9 over 20 and under 30; 3 over 30 and under 40; 12 over 40 and under 50; 9 over 50 and under 60; 9 over 60 and under 70; 10 over 70 and under 80; 4 over 80 and under 90. Of the eight unaccounted for in the above list 7 were still-born infants, and 2 were adults of ages not made known. Since September 1 there have been 24 interments, and only three of these were under 40 years. Of the total number of interments 13 died elsewhere and were brought here for interment.

**Military Convention.**  
Messrs. John L. Cantwell, M. S. Willard, Thos. C. James, F. M. Fremont and Ireddell Meares, of the Wilmington Light Infantry, a committee appointed for the purpose, have addressed a call to the companies of the State Guard for a convention to be held in Raleigh on Tuesday, January 23d, to memorialize the Legislature for an annual appropriation to defray the expenses of necessarily incurred for the maintenance of the Guard, and to provide for an annual encampment. Arrangements for reduced transportation will be made, and each command is requested to send a large delegation as possible, composed of its best men, regardless of rank. General and field officers are requested to attend. Delegates to be in full-dress uniform, with side arms.

## Luxury in Travelling.

During the last ten years the railroad managers throughout the country have been striving with persistent energy to run their trains at the greatest possible speed consistent with safety, and in this they have so far succeeded as almost to have annihilated time and distance. They have also adopted every means to free the passengers from the annoyance and fatigue incident to long journeys, and through the introduction of sleeping cars, added to luxuriously furnished regular passenger coaches, have succeeded so far as in a great measure to have robbed travel of its perplexities and discomforts. The greatest difficulty which travellers have had to encounter has been in obtaining their meals with any sort of regularity or satisfaction, and where children had to be provided for the annoyance was oftentimes extreme.

The ingenuity of man, however, has been equal to the occasion, and the perplexity to which we have alluded need no longer exist. The Pullman Palace Car Company, seeing the needs of travellers, have constructed a "Beaufort Car," which is supplied with every convenience for eating, drinking, sleeping, smoking and travelling, so that after a comfortable night's rest, during which hundreds of miles have been traversed, he can rise in the morning and have a cup of coffee, tea or chocolate and a lunch as soon as he pleases, after which he can adjourn to one of the cosiest little smoking rooms imaginable and indulge in his cigar. We had the pleasure of an inspection of one of these cars, the *Aton*, this morning, at the Front street depot, and think the following description may be of interest to our readers:

The car is painted of a dark color, ornamented with old gold. Each truck frame has three sets of wheels, making twelve wheels to the car. On entering the door of the coach we came first to the gentlemen's wash room and then to the smoking room, which will accommodate four or five smokers, and is so constructed that none of the odor or smoke can enter the other portions of the car. The next room was the pantry, which is fitted up with drawers, lockers, &c., in the neatest and most convenient manner. There is apparatus for making coffee, tea and chocolate and appliances for preparing sandwiches, a fine service of silver ware and also a closet in which it is proposed to place a small and select library for the use of the passengers, to enable them the better to while away the monotonous hours of a long journey. The next was the car proper and further on was a small private room capable of accommodating four persons, and still further was the ladies' dressing room, with every appliance for making or arranging the toilet. The inside finish is solid mahogany, inlaid with various kinds of Brazilian woods, all in their natural color, but so arranged as to give the appearance of very tasteful and ornate paint work, of which there is not a particle in the car. The upholstery is in plain crimson. Between each two seats there is a place for a small table that can be adjusted or taken down at pleasure. The car is heated by pipes conveying hot air from a large stove which is entirely concealed from view in one end.

The *Aton*, of which we have thus attempted to give some description, is the first to arrive here of sixteen that have been ordered constructed by the Atlantic Coast Line, which are to be run between New York and Jacksonville, Fla., via Washington, D. C., Richmond, Va., Wilmington, N. C., Charleston, S. C. and Savannah, Ga. It cannot be known definitely what the cost of these cars will be until the whole are completed, but we are informed by Mr. Goodman, who represents the Pullman Company and to whom we are under many obligations for courtesies extended, that they will not cost less than \$15,000 each.

Notwithstanding the inclement weather the *Aton* was visited during the day by many of our citizens, among whom were several ladies.
